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From the Rector



Fr. McDuffie

Dear Friends in Christ,

As I sat in my office wondering what I wanted to say to you in the February issue of the Angelus, I felt uninspired – and then I decided that I would pull up one of the old Angelus messages from one of the prior February issues of years gone by, and see if it could be used. After all, I thought, nobody would remember what I wrote several years ago, because I can't remember what I wrote myself!

I pulled up my letter from six years ago – and was surprised, and saddened, to see that nothing much has changed in some of the distressing places of human life. Just days before what I am writing now, a mentally ill man named Esteban Santiago opened fire with his pistol at the Fort Lauderdale Airport, killing five people and wounding eight others. Mr. Santiago had apparently presented himself to FBI agents in the fall, claiming he was hearing voices, and that the Government was controlling his mind and ordering him to watch ISIS videos. His gun was confiscated from him, and he voluntarily entered a psychiatric facility, only to be discharged some four days later – whereupon his gun was returned to him. Clearly this seems to be once again a failure in our inadequate mental health care system in this country.

Not only does inadequate mental health care continue to trouble me, but the abundant availability of guns, coupled with negative, inflammatory political rhetoric and a society veering toward less civility, continues to trouble me as well. So here, therefore, is what I wrote in January of 2011. Does it sound familiar, six years later?

As I sit here writing my greeting to you for the February issue of our parish newsletter, I am praying for the very soul of our nation. There is considerable focus on the tragedy in Tucson, Arizona, that took place on Saturday, January 8. A young man named Jared Lee Loughner allegedly shot and killed six people and injured another 14 at a public event hosted by Congresswoman Gabrielle Giffords. It is claimed that Mr. Loughner is mentally unstable. In the wake of the shootings, the sale of handguns, particularly 9mm Glock pistols (the Glock was Mr. Loughner's alleged weapon of choice), has dramatically jumped higher in Arizona.

The tragedy has taken on political overtones. Gun control advocates are asking how an allegedly unstable individual could so easily acquire a lethal weapon. Their opponents claim that everybody has a right to bear arms, and in Arizona one can legally carry a concealed weapon. And there are debates raging over whether angry political rhetoric in the nation could have influenced the shootings. Rush Limbaugh and Bill O'Reilly argue that there is no connection between the political climate and the shootings – the gunman was simply crazy. On the other hand, Bob Walkup, the mayor of Tucson said, "It's time for us to start caring about each other. It's time for us to start being kind to each other. We can debate each other, but we don't need to target each other." And Clarence Dupnik, Sheriff of Pima County, Arizona said "We have become a mecca for prejudice and bigotry", as he sought to connect angry rhetoric with the tragedy. Rush Limbaugh predictably shot back with angry, demeaning, accusatory comments, saying "So you think the shooter should be acquitted? To you liberals, it's always someone else's fault."

What do you think, and what is the appropriate Christian response? I will tell you what I think. I am sick and tired of polarizing rhetoric and incendiary comments, designed to foment rage and discontent. We can hold that Jared Loughner acted from his own distorted free will, but my psychiatric training tells me that symptomatic behavior does not exist in a vacuum. We know that when there is chronic or acute anxiety in families, individuals can become more dysfunctional and exhibit any number of increased physical or emotional symptoms. I would argue that in a society where inflammatory rhetoric becomes the norm for discourse, destructive behavior is going to occur at a higher rate than in a society where civility is held as a value.

This coming weekend is the national observance of the anniversary of the birth of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, who was a champion of non-violence. We would do well to pray for his inspiration in these perilous times. This coming weekend we also bid farewell to Granville Paules, one of the beloved members of Christ Church. Gran was a man who believed deeply that we should all care for one another and be kind to one another. He believed that gentle persuasion always trumped tactics of targeting and demeaning others. At his service we will sing a hymn adapted from the prayer of St. Francis:

*Make me a channel of your peace.
Where there is hatred let me bring your
love.
Where there is injury, your pardon, Lord
And where there's doubt, true faith in
you.
Oh, Master grant that I may never seek
So much to be consoled as to console
To be understood as to understand
To be loved as to love with all my soul.*

We are not talking of liberal political gibberish. We are speaking to the gospel of Jesus Christ. If there is anything that God can teach us in Jesus, it is about cultivating a life in which we can become more charitable. If there is anything that Tucson can teach us, let it be this.

My thoughts haven't changed from what I wrote six years ago. I continue to be praying for the soul of this nation as a new presidency is about to commence. Can we all be united to be on "the same team", as outgoing president Barack Obama said recently? Can we strive

to be a nation “with malice toward none and charity toward all”, as Abraham Lincoln said in his second inaugural address? Can we discover new insights into how to curb the ever-present threat of more gun violence?

In a wonderful poem that Cindy Simpson shared with some of us during Advent, Wendell Berry writes on the subject of how to live with hope in this broken world. He writes of first coming to know our own places where we live, and move, and have our being, and then extending our understanding to caring for others in our own place, and then to others beyond that place. In the next-to-last stanza of the poem he writes:

Found your hope, then, on the ground under your feet. / Your hope of Heaven let it rest on the ground underfoot. Be it lighted by the light that falls/ freely upon it after the darkness of the nights/ and the darkness of our own ignorance and madness. / Let it also be lighted by the light that is within you,/ which is the light of imagination. By it you see/ the likeness of other people in other places to yourself/ in your place. It lights invariably the need for care/ toward other people, other creatures, in other places/ as you would ask them for care toward your place and you. (Wendell Berry, “2007, VI”)

Let us live in expectant hope in this Epiphany season, a season of light.

Inside Outreach

An Update on the Christ Church Outreach Program

Psalm 107:9: “For he satisfies the thirsty and fills the hungry with good things.”

Just days before Thanksgiving, more than 70 members of Christ Church gathered in the Dining Room to prepare over 15,000 meals as part of our Stop Hunger Now Outreach program. Father McDuffie opened the morning with a blessing as well as dedicating the event in the memory of Mike Hines, a long time parishioner who had organized the event over the past several years. Mike’s son David led the group in a moving prayer to open the event.

The energized group enthusiastically packed the meals with a loud gong ringing each time they packed another 1,000 meals. Our group also included great participation from the

Korean congregation on hand. Christ Church has been participating in the meal packing event for the past eight years, and has collectively packed more than 130,000 meals!

In follow-up communication from Stop Hunger Now (SHN), we have learned that the meals from our meal packaging event on November 19th, 2016 have been shipped in a container with a total of 285,120 meals from the local SHN National Capital warehouse. Meals are being shipped to Haiti and received by the SHN in-country partner Northern Haiti Alliance.

The shipment is on its way to three partner organizations working together in Northern Haiti: the Robert Ford Haitian School and Orphanage Foundation, Hands for Haiti, and College John Wesley. All three partners focus on sustainable community development and ensure that their programs are effectively run and "owned" by the communities they benefit.

The Robert Ford Foundation serves a variety of needs in the profoundly impoverished Grison-Garde community. More than 700 school students receive a free education and daily meal, and 50 orphaned children receive daily care and food. The foundation also reaches out to children and their families outside of the school to provide food and medical care for the students, orphans, and people in need throughout rural northern Haiti (www.fordhaitianorphanage.org).

Hands for Haiti is the sole means of financial support for The Solidarity School in Tremesse Village, Haiti. It was founded on the belief that education is the key to breaking the cycle of poverty. Hands for Haiti also provides food, clean water, and other basic needs for the 230 children at the Solidarity School (www.handsforhaiti.com).

The College John Wesley in Cap-Haitien provides an education to 350 children in primary and secondary school. With many needs and few resources, these children have a difficult time concentrating in school because of hunger. Your meals will not only fill their bellies, these meals will also allow students the opportunity to learn effectively.

Special thanks to everyone who came out for a tremendous morning helping fight world hunger and participating in a wonderful Outreach event. If you were there in November, we hope to see you again at our 2017 event, and if you weren't there, make sure to attend in 2017!

The Outreach Committee meets the second Tuesday of each month from 7:30 p.m. – 8:30 p.m. in the Parish House beside the church. The next meeting will be February 14th, 2017. 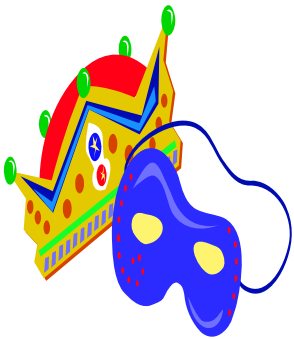
