From the Rector



Fr. McDuffie

Dear Friends in Christ,

As I write this letter for our April issue of the Angelus, we are in the midst of Lent, and when you read it, we will still be in Lent. Easter seems a long way off – April 20th – and we have slogged through a long, long, winter. In her poem “March”, Louise Gluck writes, “The light stays longer in the sky, but it’s a cold light, / it brings no relief from winter.” This is a season of latency, a time of waiting for resurrection.

And yet, as we wait for Easter to come, I can celebrate with you the good news that we have already experienced a resurrection moment at Christ Church. On February 9th, I spoke to the congregation with the sobering news that we had a \$90,000 financial deficit, owing to two consecutive years in which our expenses had exceeded income, plus a gap in hoped-for pledged income to fund the 2014 budget (which had already been adjusted). On behalf of the Vestry, I made a simple appeal to all to consider making an additional contribution to the church or increasing their 2014 pledge.

The wonderful good news is that many of you responded with gracious wills and generous hearts, and as of March 9th, we had raised slightly more than \$100,000 in contributions and increased pledges! This is a marvelous testimony to your belief in Christ Church to be a blessed community where vital ministry is taking place. The Vestry is encouraged that we have a small budgetary reserve for the remainder of 2014 to deal with unexpected contingencies (as an example, believe me that snow removal costs will greatly exceed what we have paid in prior recent years). I can assure you that we are not now living extravagantly or foolishly, but rather are living prudently and carefully for the remainder of the year, with the pledge to be faithful stewards of the resources entrusted to us.

This resurrection event has been a great joy, but in the midst of managing our resources, the Vestry is also coming to a new understanding of where we are at this moment in the life of this congregation and in the life of the Church at this point in history. For the first time in a while, we have experienced vulnerability, which raises all

the questions of how we allocate resources when times are tight. These are questions with which many of our Episcopal Church neighbors are already grappling with. Of course, my prayer is that all can continue to give at their increased level of giving for 2014 after the appeal, but whether that can take place again for 2015 remains to be seen – and we certainly don't want to launch a special appeal each year.

At Christ Church, we don't have a lot of "wobble room" in our budget. Costs in maintenance and in staff compensation are rising each year. The three major programmatic areas of the church are music, outreach and social ministry, and Christian education and youth ministry. These programs are where we have to make adjustments when necessary. Three years ago, the Vestry embarked on a strategic planning process in which we identified the potential challenges of resource allocation in the future. That planning process was quietly put on hold, and now three years later, it is manifestly clear that we need to re-engage with some strategic planning. We need to be clear on who we are, what our mission is and where our mission field lies, and what we value in the life of ministry in this Church.

To that end, our new Vestry that will convene after the Annual Meeting in early May will launch into this process, and we hope it will also involve as many of you as are able to participate. You can look forward to hearing more about this important work in the near future.

For now, I say again "Thank you!" from the bottom of my heart, for your generous support of Christ Church. It is a joy to be here, and I wish a blessed remainder of Lent and glorious Eastertide to all.

Seminarian News

Our prayers will go with Patrick Bush, our seminarian, as he journeys to his home parish, Trinity Church, in Tariffville, Connecticut, where he will be ordained a deacon on March 29th. Patrick did well on his General Ordination exams in January, passing in five of the seven canonical areas of examination, and the Diocese of Connecticut gave him the green light for ordination! So when Patrick returns to us on April 6th, he will be able to function in his newly ordained role. Patrick's last Sunday at Christ Church will be May 18th, and at this writing, he is anticipating returning for employment in parish ministry in his home Diocese.

I'm also happy to announce that Christ Church will have a new seminarian who will join us this fall for two years. Bradley Linboom is from the Diocese of Chicago, and comes

from a musical career into the ordination process. Brad has been an organist and choirmaster for three different churches in the past, the most recent being St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Dixon, Illinois from 2010 to 2013. He has also been a school band director. Brad's principal instrument has been the bassoon (which he sadly tells me he had to sell in order to help finance his seminary education!), and he also plays the double bass. Having obtained a Master's degree in music theory from the University of Akron in 2003, Brad also sang in the choir of St. Paul's, Akron, where Father McDuffie began his career in ordained ministry. Brad is married, and his wife is a clinical social worker.

Among other things, Brad is interested in seeing how the church might intersect more meaningfully and powerfully with the local neighborhood, including the Town Center. I know you will welcome Brad warmly when he joins us at Christ Church.

Bach's Mass in B-Minor
National Philharmonic Chorale

Three members of the Christ Church Choir will be part of the National Philharmonic Chorale in the very beautiful *Mass in B-Minor* by J.S. Bach, to be performed on Saturday, April 12th at 8:00 p.m. and Sunday, April 13th, 2014 (Palm Sunday) at 3:00 p.m. at Strathmore.

This exquisite composition, a beloved part of the classical repertoire, is renowned for its musical complexity and personal, political, and religious intrigues.

The *Mass in B-Minor*, an autobiographical summary by Bach himself of his life's work of choral composition, was the last work of his life, completed shortly before his death in 1750. This masterpiece elevated the choral art form to a state of transcendence that reflects Bach's deep religious and aesthetic convictions.

From Renaissance times until now, people have entertained with a varied “menu” of music at their table. In this tradition, the Singers offer up a light spring fare to please your discerning taste – a concert that has it all: stars, animals, mysticism, love, dance, and humor!

The madrigal comedy **Festino**, written by Italian monk Adriano Banchieri, features choral depictions of dances, wine-tasting, and the *Counterpoint of the Animals*, while contemporary Norwegian Ola Gjeilo expands in a mystic style with **Unicornis Captivator**. The music of love comes forth in Brahms' eloquent vocal quartets, paired with a heavenly gaze in a regional premiere of **Stars** written by Latvian composer Erik Esenvalds accompanied by the sheen of tuned water glasses. Comedy fare rounds out the program with Eric Whitacre's zany **Animal Crackers** and the gossipy **Neighbors' Chorus** by Offenbach.

The National Philharmonic Singers, led by Stan Engebretson and Victoria Gau, is a chamber choir and one of several performing ensembles of the National Philharmonic, which is in residence at the Music Center at Strathmore. As such, it promotes works suited for smaller ensembles, whether with accompaniment or *A cappella*. Its repertoire ranges from 15th to 21st centuries, and it often premieres new compositions by local composers. In the summer of 2013, the group was invited to participate in the international choral competition in Llangollen, Wales. This is the ninth year of performance at Christ Church with free-will offering benefiting the Community Ministries of Rockville.

Sharing Our Sources

I think many of us have trouble finding time to pray, so I thought this meditation, which appeared in the Washington Cathedral's newsletter in March 2007, might offer inspiration. It was written by the late John Miers, who was a parishioner at St. James in Potomac.

"I Pray on Escalators

I am always in a hurry.

I never have enough time.

How could I possibly have time to pray like I should?

How can I possibly be aware of the other people in the world – those who need my prayers the very most? And have the time to follow through on it?

Well...

There is a time when I have this time by myself.

There is a time when I am aware of other people.

There is a time when I wonder about other people and their needs.

It is on the escalators in the Metro system. I have at least eight such opportunities – two rides down, and two rides back up, twice a day.

What do I pray for – what should you pray for? Well, to start, look at the other people on the escalator – either going the other way, or those rushing and bumping past you.

Go ahead and look at them.

I find myself wondering:

What are their needs?

Are they sick?

Are they happy?

Are they grieving?

Are they hungry?

How are their families – if they have families?

Do they have nice clothes – or not enough clothes?

Are they illegal immigrants?

What can I do – what should I do? I can pray about any and all of this.

Try it yourself: This opportunity also presents itself while riding on the Metro and on buses. There are times for prayer on elevators, too, and also at stop lights, while standing in line, or on hold on the telephone.

We are blessed with an abundance of opportunities to pray (while waiting for the trainee at the Post Office to figure out what combination of stamps is needed to put \$2.44 on an envelope). We can all learn – and start availing ourselves of these wonderful opportunities in our lives.”

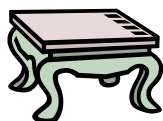

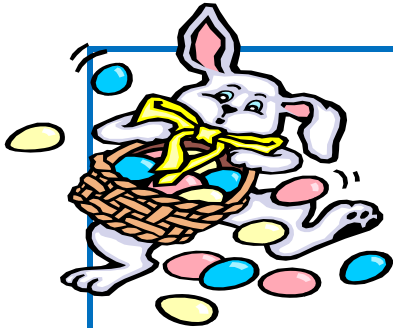

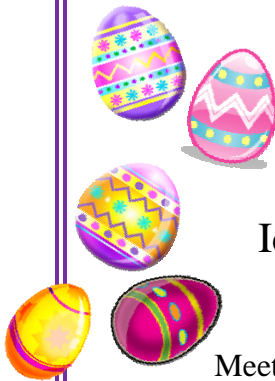
