Transition Update from Christie Carrico

As we prepare to enter our third month without Fr. McDuffie, I would like to assure you that things are happening. First, we have a Search Committee. At its February meeting, the Vestry appointed the following individuals to be members of the Search Committee under Chair, Janice Musselman: David Craig, Barbara Fennelly, Honoré Kaseya, Susan Lin, Emily Pearce, Lynn Posorske, Steven Renfroe, Jim Suit, and Mark Wright. The Search Committee has received its charge from the Vestry and has already met with the Rev. Canon Paula Clark to review their responsibilities. One of the foremost of these is the need for complete confidentiality. Even the Vestry will not be privy to their discussions and decisions until ultimately the Search Committee presents a slate of up to three candidates to the Vestry. I would ask you, the members of our Congregation, to respect this need for confidentiality as well and not ask members of the Search Committee questions that they will have to refuse to answer. Be assured that you will be kept informed of the progress of the search process if not the particulars.

As I write this, a subcommittee of the Vestry is preparing to review the credentials of candidates for the Interim Rector position. Rev. Canon Clark has just returned from a conference for transitional ministry at which she planned to do some initial screening for potential Interim candidates for us. We will need to interview these candidates, and depending on the timing of their availability, we hope to have an Interim Rector in place by the Annual Meeting, on April 22nd.

Speaking of the Annual Meeting, on April 22nd, there will be only one service, at 9:00 a.m., followed by the Annual Meeting. We will be electing four Vestry members and a Senior Warden. Because your Vestry felt that continuity in leadership was critical during this transition phase, two of our Vestry members, Meghan Matulka and Steve McNeil, our Treasurer, have agreed to additional terms. For the same reason, I have agreed to run for an additional one-year term as Senior Warden. This will be my fifth year as Senior Warden, and because I was on the Vestry for four months before becoming Senior Warden, that extends my term beyond what is allowed in the Church bylaws. The Vestry will, therefore, be seeking at the Annual Meeting, your approval of an amendment that adds an additional article to our bylaws to allow for me to serve more than a five-year term on Vestry. This amendment applies only to this year's election and automatically repeals itself in two years.

ARTICLE IX - TRANSITION AND TECHNICAL PROVISIONS

Section 1. The Limitation of Term provision contained in Section 6 of Article III shall not apply to the election of the Senior Warden at the Annual Parish Meeting occurring in April 2018.

Section 2. This Article automatically shall be repealed upon the adjournment of the Annual Parish Meeting occurring in 2020.

New members running for three-year terms on Vestry are Rob Follit and Audra Snider.

Please plan on attending the Parish Annual Meeting, and don't forget that Michele Craig and the Youth Group are planning another scrumptious brunch immediately following the conclusion of the meeting.

An Update on the Christ Church Outreach Program



“What good is it to say [to the poor] ‘God bless you! Keep warm and eat well’—if you don’t give them the necessities of life?”

James 2:16

April offers two great ways to help those in need get the ‘necessities of life’.

Participate in our Church-wide event on April 7th (9:30 a.m. - 12:30 p.m.) at A Wider Circle, an organization in Silver Spring that furnishes the homes of more than 4,000 local families each year. We will be sorting and inspecting donations, making sure that only the best ends up in the homes of people who are starting a new life or who have lost everything as a result of homelessness, fire, or some other personal tragedy.

This will be a Church-wide event, suitable for adults, teens and children (accompanied by an adult). The tasks we'll be assigned vary from inspecting linens for rips and stains to testing out appliances. Perhaps some of the hardier members of our group will be asked to help move boxes or furniture. There will be a task for everyone according to their abilities.

A Wider Circle makes only one request: that you be prepared to spend the full three hours that we have been allotted. This helps the organization to make the best use of their staff and resources. For more information, look for the “Church-wide Event” advertisement in the church bulletin or call Mary Belknap 301-251-1486.

All through April, you also can help those in need with the ‘necessities of life’ by participating in Christ Church’s Cleaning Supply Drive for the Kaseman Clinic. The Clinic, located just two blocks from our church, provides a range of services to adult patients who are low income or who have no health insurance. Before you buy any supplies, please look at the following list of acceptable items, which will also be posted on the Outreach Committee bulletin board in the Church dining room:

Acceptable items include Tall Kitchen Trash Bags, Small Trash Bags, C-Fold Paper Towels (#2 Box), Rolls of Paper Towels, Antibacterial Hand Soap, Hand Sanitizer, Scouring Powder, Facial Tissue, Toilet Paper, Lysol Toilet Bowl Cleaner, Disinfecting Wipes, Windex, Bleach, Pinesol, Dish Washing Liquid, Napkins, Paper Cups, and Bottled Water.

You can put your supplies in the box provided in the dining room. Please do not leave items in the dining room until the box is available in April. Contact Emily Correll at egcorrell@verizon.net for more information.

And finally, remember that Christ Church helps those in need all year by volunteering in the Loaves and Fishes program. On the 3rd Sunday each month, Christ Church members help prepare and serve meals for homeless men and women at St Stephen and The Incarnation Church, D.C. This may be a perfect way for you to help others get ‘the necessities of life’. Please contact Emily Correll for more information on Loaves and Fishes.

Alternatives to Plastic Packaging


A grocery store aisle in the Netherlands has 700 Items that are all Plastic-Free! Many of the items in the aisle are wrapped in biodegradable packaging that decomposes in 12 weeks in a home composter. Other containers are glass, cardboard, and metal. The store, EkoPlaza, plans to expand this concept to all 74 of its stores by the end of the year. The company is taking this action because “plastic food and drink packaging remains useful for a matter of days yet remains a destructive presence on the earth for centuries afterwards.”


Reflections on our Lenten Film Series

Ongoing Activities

- Don't forget our pet food drive to help keep pets with their families. Pet food donations benefit local families struggling to provide for their pets. In many cases, providing pet food to families makes the difference between being able to keep their pet or having to surrender them due to a lack of food. With our donations, Christ Church is making a difference!

Many dogs, cats, and other critters are waiting for their forever families at the Montgomery County Animal Services and Adoption Center.
