## From the Rector

Consider the language we use when we talk about life. We talk of moving through life. We don't stand still, but we are in transit. Perhaps we are more like sharks than we would like to be. There are some that must constantly swim in order to allow oxygen rich water to move through their gills, keeping them alive. Maybe that is urban, or ocean, myth. But it is a good reminder.

CES concluded STEAM Week truly feeling it was "best ever." Throughout the year, the school program integrates science, technology, engineering, arts and math...plus emphasizes team-based work. But, during STEAM Week, students were immersed every day in STEAM presentations, activities and projects.

The outside speakers working in various STEAM-related careers who presented to students at all age levels came from extremely diverse fields. We welcomed a nuclear physicist, a Georgetown professor who does bio-medical research, a software engineer, a vaccine specialist, a marine biologist, personnel from the Montgomery County recycling facility and....a former CDC researcher who uses his medical background to write mystery novels! What rich and inspiring messages our students heard!

Mid-week, our 5th grade class set up assorted STEAM activities in the Murdock Room for the other classes to experience. And, on Friday of STEAM Week, the 8th grade presented their annual Science Fair in the Murdock Room through detailed displays and oral descriptions. Outside judges evaluated their projects and presentations, and "top" projects will go to the Mid Atlantic Episcopal Schools (MAESA) Scholars Fair on April 25 at National Cathedral School for further competition. The week provided not just "something of interest for everyone" but "many exciting options for everyone!"

## Inside Outreach

*An Update on the Christ Church Outreach Program*

*“Let us be concerned for one another, to help one another to show love and to do good”  
Hebrews 10:24*

On a sunny spring day recently, a group of Christ Church volunteers spent a morning at A Wider Circle, a non-profit in Silver Spring that focuses on getting donated household goods into the hands of people starting new lives.

My job that day was to re-stock the showroom with linens and baby clothes. On one of my trips from the downstairs warehouse to the upstairs showroom, I met a young couple picking out a layette for a baby girl they expected by the end of the week. The couple asked for my help in picking out clothing that wouldn't label their child as either a boy or girl, explaining that they wanted their friends and family to see their child first as a person and not as a rambunctious boy or cute little girl. At the last moment, however, they couldn't resist a lovely pink comforter, which they added to their pile of yellow, green and orange clothing and then continued on their way to shop for furniture and housewares in another part of the showroom.

For me, that pink comforter encapsulated our experience at A Wider Circle. An hour before, that same comforter was in the hands of two of our Christ Church volunteers in the 'linen inspection room' of the warehouse. Their standards were high. The smallest stain, frayed edge, or tired-looking tassel consigned an item to either the animal shelter pile or the ragbag. But our volunteers needed to work quickly to keep the showroom stocked. During our 3-hour stint, Christ Church members inspected, sorted and sent up to the showroom some 40 bags of sheets, towels and other linens as well as several large boxes of children's clothing, most of which were gone by the end of our shift.

While most of us worked in the sorting area, another Christ Church volunteer worked in the unloading area. Every 15 minutes, a pick-up truck, a car or, occasionally, a small moving van would pull up filled with furniture, housewares, toys – almost any item you would find in a typical home. Each piece of furniture, box, and bag needed to be hand carried to a specific part of the 4000sq. foot warehouse, a feat that required not only muscle but also memory. Our volunteer racked up a considerable number of steps!

The founder of A Wider Circle, Dr. Mark Bergel, said in recent interview, “I do not know what we are doing here on this planet if we are not here to take care of one another – to do whatever it takes to help our fellow human beings have a good quality of life. And it has to be much more than just talk.” To me, Dr. Bergel echoes the words of scripture in the quote above. Our volunteer day at A Wider Circle was one way that we at Christ Church work together “to show our concern for one another, to help one another to show love, and to do good.”

The Outreach Committee puts on these Church-wide events several times a year. Not only is there a job for everyone, but these events are a good way to become better acquainted with church members you may only see in passing at coffee hour or during a service. Please join us for our next Church-wide Outreach event.

- Learn more about a specific way that climate change or environmental degradation affects people near you. Stretch yourself and listen to the stories of hurting neighbors, and find ways to ally with them.

Life-Giving: We will change our habits and choices in order to live more simply, humbly and gently on the Earth.
