## From the Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

As I write this letter, I'm in the last days of my summer vacation, and Mary and I have just returned from the highlight of our summer – a wonderful trip to Rio de Janeiro and the Olympic Games. I am fortunate that Mary has an esteemed position with a financial company, and that we could be guests of Visa.

Before we went to Rio, I was nervous because of all the negative media hype about the city – Zika virus, crime, pollution, bacteria-resistant super bugs in the water supply, and so on. Thankfully, we encountered none of that! We stayed in a wonderful hotel with a room overlooking the beach volleyball stadium on Copacabana beach, and Visa took care of us with such luxuriant graciousness that I told their event planner, “I now know that if I die and go to heaven, Visa will be waiting to greet me!”

Rio de Janeiro has to have one of the most beautiful physical settings in the world for a city, and I had dreamed of visiting there ever since I was a teenager and was introduced to the bossa nova music of Antonio Carlos Jobim. It was a thrill to be in places associated with famous songs – such as Ipanema, and Corcovado, site of the world-famous Cristo Redentor statue. Brazilians are warm and welcoming, and we got points because Mary was a high school exchange student in Bahia and still can speak Portuguese!

And of course there was the thrill of attending the games themselves – a few of them, anyway. It was an eye-opener for me to realize that there were several different locales for different events. Rio is a vast, sprawling city, and with the exception of the beach volleyball stadium across the street (where we saw the ultimate gold medal-winning German women's team crush their Canadian opponents), the other Olympic locales we visited were up to an hour away by bus. We got to see many track and field events (including the great Usain Bolt's gold medal triumph in the 100-meter event), men's gymnastics (ring and vault finals), women's gymnastics (balance beam finals), and one wild and crazy basketball game between Spain and Argentina. In that event (which Spain easily won) the attendees were 80% Argentina fans, and the intensity of their involvement in the game rivaled that of a World Cup soccer match.

In all of this (with the unfortunate exception of the behavior of Ryan Lochte and friends), I was deeply impressed and moved by the dignity and grace of the athletes themselves, and the ways in which sports can promote a brotherhood and sisterhood that transcends geographical, national, and cultural differences. May the summer games be one way in which we can look toward the impossible possibility of world peace.

September is coming, and with it a busy fall season at Christ Church. Please come and be with us on Sunday, September 11<sup>th</sup>, which is the last Sunday of our summer schedule. During the 10:00 a.m. service, we will have our annual blessing of children's backpacks, and afterward there will be a lunch reception hosted by our Fellowship Committee. It is a great time to greet old friends and meet new ones. Our schedule of three services (7:45 a.m., 9:00 a.m., and 11:00 a.m.) resumes on September 18<sup>th</sup>.

*An Update on the Christ Church Outreach Program*



#### **Proverbs 15:22 “Plans fail for lack of counsel, but with many advisers they succeed.”**

The Outreach Committee began a discernment process in February of this year. Working as a team and with the guidance of Sam Ireland of the congregation, who is experienced in strategic planning, we met several times through the spring. The reason for all of these meetings was based on a visit by Bishop Mariann last year. The Bishop said that churches with outreach efforts that are more focused are sometimes more effective. We felt that this was worth pursuing.

Sam guided the Committee through the process with the end result of developing a mission statement. This mission statement was then used to develop goals. In the end, the mission statement will guide, but not dictate, decisions made by the Committee, such as how to allocate funds the Committee has been asked to manage. The mission statement we developed is as follows:

The Outreach Committee serves as tangible evidence of God’s love by providing joyful opportunities to give of our time, talents, and treasure. We strive to make a difference in the lives of people in need, respecting their dignity and promoting justice in common human needs such as food, clothing, housing, and medical care. As stewards of the financial resources entrusted to us, we will join with selected established local, national, and international agencies in order to satisfy short-term needs and effect long-term changes.

The goals we have developed from this mission statement include focusing on common human needs, stewardship, and partnership. Common human needs that we are concerned with include food and housing for those in need. Stewardship is related to ensuring that funds entrusted to the Committee’s care are used wisely. Finally, partnership means that the Outreach Committee works with others to reach common goals.



## Relax and Play

*Learn to enjoy life more. Relax, remembering that I am God with you. I crafted you with enormous capacity to know Me and enjoy My Presence. When My people wear sour faces and walk through their lives with resigned rigidity, I am displeased. When you walk through a day with childlike delight, savoring every blessing, you proclaim your trust in Me, your ever-present Shepherd. The more you focus on My Presence with you, the more fully you can enjoy life. Glorify Me through your pleasure in Me. August 15<sup>th</sup> was World Relaxation Day. Yet in this season of life, with a preschooler and infant and a rewarding career, taking time to relax seems almost laughable, if not downright frivolous. I often find myself trying to do more: whether it is to meet another deadline at work, clean and put away stuff at home, or squeeze in another birthday party or activity. I am learning though that taking on too much wreaks havoc on our family routines, can take us weeks to recover from, and is ultimately just not worth it. So for the past half year, I have been making a few changes at home that are allowing for more relaxation and play. Our children seem happier and my faith in God never stronger.

**Putting God first.** I spend the first five minutes upon waking each day reading the Bible or a devotional such as *Jesus Calling* or *Proverbs 31*. Having unhurried time to be close to God (and drink coffee), before my husband and children are awake keeps me centered and helps set my priorities for the day. When I occasionally wake up late and in a hurry, I can feel the difference all day.

My wonderful husband watches our children on many weekends so I can be involved in ministry work at Christ Church. Altar Guild gives me a chance to help set God's table and enjoy fellowship with other faithful parishioners. For most services, we have our children with us so this gives me a chance to pray and reflect on life when the church is quiet. Until last fall, I also coordinated the flower delivery ministry for pastoral care needs of our parishioners. Some of you may have seen me on flower delivery day, a vase of flowers in one arm and a toddler in the other. Or I may have asked you to watch my sleeping child after church while I ran in to grab the flowers, cards, and directions. On occasion, I have been asked, why



I would volunteer to deliver flowers, what with so many demands on my time? While I love seeing the look on parishioners faces when I bring them flowers, the biggest reason is to model caring about someone and something greater than ourselves to my children. One day, my daughter asked me as we were leaving the church with the flowers, “Are we going to make someone happy today?” This coming out of the mouth of a 3-year-old made me quite proud.

**Early to bed, early to rise.** After dinner is quiet playtime with the children, followed by cleaning of the kitchen and preparations for the next day such as filling the coffee pot, making lunches, and setting out clothes. We try to get the kids tucked away early so that between 9:00 p.m. and 10:00 p.m., my husband and I can have a full hour for relaxation activities such as reading, drawing, or listening to music. I like to crawl into bed no later than 9:30 p.m., with the goal of having lights out by 10:00 p.m. Most nights, this means leaving some dishes in the sink or laundry to fold, but when I wake the next morning, I am able to get it done much quicker because I am rested. Other mornings I like to write, go for a walk, get a jump start dinner, or get cleaning tasks out of the way. I find that being rested is the single most important thing I can do for my family.

**Going part time at work.** Until very recently when I was working full time, the little time I had left for our children at the end of the day left me frazzled and stressed. Recently, I have been fortunate to drop to half-time so that I am only in the office two short days a week. This allows me to feed my preschooler breakfast before school and bring her home to unwind before dinnertime. It also gives me time to cook early in the day so that the dinner hour can be a relaxing time to reconnect after a long day.

**One activity (or none) per day.** While we are all for ballet, swim, and piano as much as the next family, so far we have resisted signing up our children for any regular classes. We prefer leaving our weekends unscheduled so that we can do spontaneous activities together such as going for a family swim or berry picking at the farm. We love to play board games or with toys after dinner. On the occasional weekday, I enjoy keeping my daughter home from preschool for a playdate or to just stay home and cook or paint together. Our children are growing up *so fast* and I want to cherish this time, as our home will be empty and quiet again soon enough. I believe by seeking out more relaxation and play, such as is found in Godly Play workshops (<http://www.godlyplayfoundation.org/>), we can become more like little children and find greater happiness. “*I tell you the truth, unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. Therefore, whoever humbles himself like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven.*” -Matthew 18:1-4


