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The Interim's Corner

I want to thank everyone for the wonderful warm welcome you provided for me and John as we joined you in ministry August 1. We feel blessed to be among you and look forward to our months together.

Have you been wondering what an Interim Rector is or does with a parish in transition? You are likely not alone!

Essentially an interim rector has two large tasks during the transition time: (1) to function as rector of the parish until shortly before the new rector arrives and (2) to prepare the leadership and congregation for the arrival of the new rector.

Here are some things that interims do...that happen to be things that Christ Church vestry has called me to do!

- Help the congregation deal with its grief and any other unresolved issues arising from the rector's departure
- Educate the leadership and members about the dynamics of transition and healthy faith communities
- Prepare people for changes – providing plenty of opportunity for people to talk about changes that will be made during the transition time and with the new rector
- Deal with internal conflicts and helping to heal any divisions within the congregation
- Conduct an Administrative, Staff, and Policy review in consultation with the vestry
- Explore new and alternative ways of “doing” ministry together in the areas of: worship, evangelism, and stewardship

This is hard work! Sometimes people love it and sometimes not. But for those who embrace the work they always find that God is there renewing their spirits and deepening their faith in Christ Jesus. And I invite you to part of it!

Come learn more at “Transition: the Blessing of Change” at the Adult Forum on October 7th. And I invite you to our Adult Forum series: “Meet Mother Debra: Find out who is, where she has served, and what brings her joy!” to learn more about me too. Bring your questions too! on September 23rd.

Exploring Sunday Morning Worship: How Many Services?

Earlier this year, Christ Church's vestry charged a small group of ministry leaders to explore the possibility of combining the 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. services, including: determining how supportive the parish was of trying this on for size; what the parish's preferences for a combined service time might be; and what else needed to be considered programmatically. The committee developed a survey which was distributed during the month of July and completed on August 5th.

The survey had a very hardy response. **64% of the respondents supported a trial of a combined service schedule.** The committee was very gratified by those of you who chose to comment on the impact this change would have on your worship here at Christ Church.

As you might imagine, trying something like this on requires quite a bit of preparation because there are so many moving parts: worship, choirs, acolytes, fellowship, formation for children, youth and adults...the list goes on. Although our staff have many ideas that could be implemented as part of the trial, there is simply not enough time between now and the beginning of the programmatic year for them to plan and execute the logistics necessary to make a smooth transition. My goal as Interim Rector, and that of the vestry and staff, is to give our best to this trial time so that at its conclusion, we can discern together how it fits Christ Church's mission to be "a vibrant, inclusive community that serves individuals and families of all ages and backgrounds."

Some of the natural next steps we will be taking...

- The staff and I will explore different models of Sunday morning worship and programming in other vibrant churches and discern alternatives for our congregation
- Staff will meet with other Sunday morning ministry leaders to explore these alternatives
- We will organize and facilitate an opportunity for the congregation to gather face-to-face, exploring what we value and engaging in conversation about the worship trial

Our goal is for our **trial period of combined worship to begin January 6th**, The Epiphany of Our Lord Jesus Christ, and to conclude prior to the summer service schedule in 2019. There will be an opportunity prior to the trial's end to engage in another congregational conversation about our shared experiences before we break for summer.

On Sunday, September 16th, we will return to the fall schedule of worship services at 7:45 a.m., 9:00 a.m., and 11:00 a.m. Welcome Back Sunday is Sunday, September 9th. Please bring your backpacks to be blessed and plan to attend the blessing of the newly renovated Murdock Room and our "Picnic for All" following our last 10:00 a.m. service.

Christ Church Search Committee Update – June 2018

Thank You!

Thanks to all of the approximately 170 people who either participated in one of the nine focus groups or submitted written responses to the four questions that were posed to parishioners. Those questions asked everyone to identify what they seek in a rector, what they see as Christ Church's strengths and challenges, and what dreams they have for the church. Broad input was received, which generated voluminous notes.

What to Expect Next

The comment process is now closed. The Search Committee will present a report that summarizes and synthesizes all the feedback by mid-June.

Historical Perspective

If you have been through a rector search at another church, or the one held here 19+ years ago that resulted in Fr. John's call as rector, you may note some differences between that experience and the current process being followed under the supervision of the Diocese. Canon Paula Clark articulated this contrast during her adult forum presentation at the beginning of our search process, explaining that our Diocese uses a narrative format instead of a traditional parish profile compilation.

Clarifying Roles

Some of the issues raised during the focus group/comment period fall outside the scope of the Search Committee (e.g., issues regarding the school, stewardship, and the capital campaign). Those kinds of issues are in the Vestry's domain and have been forwarded to them. Also, the Diocese does not permit direct contact with or input from staff members regarding the search and screening process.

What Prospective Applicants Receive

In addition to the Q&A narrative from the Diocese which the Search Committee already submitted, prospective rector candidates will receive a copy of Christ Church's latest annual report and have full access to the Christ Church website. Candidates also have access through the Diocese to financial information about Christ Church. The committee will hold interviewees accountable for being familiar with the specifics of these materials.

Christ Church Search Committee Update – July 2018

The search committee has continued to meet every Monday evening throughout June with the exception of the evening of June 25th. The meetings are very busy with many tasks.

Since completing the focus group data, the committee has reviewed various response letters to be sent to candidates regarding our receipt of their application, our level of interest for a preliminary interview, or responding to applicants who were not selected for further consideration. Those have been reworked and crafted so that the letters reflect the style and tenor of our parish.

Committee members reviewed the summary of interview questions each member submitted. Questions were grouped into meaningful categories, and a thorough discussion of the wording of the questions followed. We also assigned ourselves to areas of interest/participation with regard to the ministries, programs, and domains of our church so that we may answer questions from candidates, when needed.

The first wave of candidates has been received, and the review process for those candidates has begun. A total of nine individuals applied during our first request period which officially ended June 29th. We will be extending our timeline so that candidates who were involved with the convention or on vacation may also have a chance to apply. The process to determine which of the first group will be contacted for further consideration will continue during the month of July.

Christ Church Search Committee Update – August 2018

The Search Committee is working well as a cohesive and collaborative team during this new phase of discernment. This is a difficult process, but we are very pleased with the progress being made.

We are exuberant and excited about the 11 candidates who have applied. Though still in the interviewing process, mostly via Skype or FaceTime, four candidates have been granted a second interview, and planned visitations are being arranged.

The candidates see our church and school community as having a strong foundation and — coupled with our extraordinary music program, outreach activities, and ministries — are excited about Christ Church as their possible future home where they can stay and lay down their roots.

An Update on the Christ Church Outreach Program

Now that fall is approaching, some people think about planning. We imagine, what else do we want to accomplish before the calendar year runs out on our goals or resolutions, and we begin to consider goals for the next year. take that role seriously, the Committee has begun looking more closely at the financial management of charities and organizations we donate to. The web site Charity Navigator helps in some cases, and we plan to use other resources, while in others we ask for information directly.

Why go to all this trouble? We want to be responsible with the funds entrusted to us. As our Mission Statement says, “we strive to make a difference in the lives of people in need” while being “stewards of the financial resources entrusted to us”. Thanks for your continued support.

Christ Episcopal School

Meet Dr. Caroline Chapin who has served as our Head of School for eight years. She came to us from Tallahassee, Florida in the fall of 2010 where she had served at Holy Comforter Episcopal School (HCES) for sixteen years. While at HCES, she was a classroom teacher, curriculum coordinator, and Assistant Head of School. A native of Atlanta, Georgia,

Dr. Chapin earned her B.A. degree in Elementary Education from Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia. Later, she went on to earn a M.S. degree from Florida State University in Early Childhood Education: Theory and Practice, and her Doctor of Education in Educational Leadership from Nova Southeastern University. She is married and has two daughters, two step-daughters and her first grandbaby. She and her husband, Bob Hekl, live in Vienna, Virginia where they love to cook, work in their garden, hike, and travel.

While at Christ Episcopal School (CES), Dr. Chapin has worked with the faculty to create a vibrant and engaging curriculum for two-year-old through eighth grade students. In an answer to the increased national focus on science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) curriculum, the faculty has received training in creating lessons that teach students how to work on high performing teams, the foundation of the “way of business” in today’s workforce. One year ago, CES began a partnership with YMM Art Space, an international art school, based in Shenzhen, China and with campuses all over the world, including Canada, France and the U.S. The CES art curriculum is now provided by YMM Art Space and its art educators. CES graduates continue to be accepted at top local high schools, both private and public. Admission Directors at area high schools say, “We love CES graduates. Not only are they well prepared academically, they are also such nice people.” Of course, we know why that is.... They experience a strong academic program as well as a program that tends to their moral and ethical development, with a focus on serving others. The strong connection to a vibrant church community like Christ Episcopal Church is an important one, and it helps to nurture children into wonderful young adults.

Dr. Chapin is a strong supporter of the parish day school model because she believes that it is only through such a connection that the “whole child” can be nurtured.

A child’s spiritual development is as important as his/her cognitive and physical development. Dr. Chapin is excited to start her ninth year at CES and looks forward to an exciting year especially as together with Christ Church we continue to honor a “Firm Foundation” as we build a “Bright Future,” through our joint campaign to improve and update our church and school campus.

It is particularly dedicated to helping some of the harder to adopt animals (those with special needs, behavioral issues, quirky looks) and building effective programs to reduce the numbers of animals entering shelters nationwide. According to Rachel, during the mission trip, she and other Youth Group members weeded dog runs to prevent hiding places for rattlesnakes, spent time socializing cats, hosted two dogs in the kids' sleeping quarters to socialize them, and went for hikes with energetic dogs to give them exercise and some excitement. One of the most poignant parts of the trip was when they visited "Angel's Rest", a beautiful final resting place for the animals of the Sanctuary.



Thanks to Summer Choir

Many thanks to all girls, boys, and adults who sang in summer choir, leading congregational worship and offering special anthems, quartets, duets, and solos. We thank also Don Hague, John Widmann, and Jason West who filled in as organist-choir director while our own Tad Cavuoti attended an RSCM course at Duke University and visited several other parishes in DC, NJ, and NY. We are thankful that while many choir programs take a summer holiday for three months, we have been able to continue strong choral leadership at Christ Church.

RSCM Choristers in DC, Virginia and North Carolina

Thirty advanced Choristers and teen Choral Scholars, including our own Teddy Lin, spent a week in July living together and rehearsing exquisite Anglican choral music on the campus of Marymount College in Arlington, VA. Guest director Michael McCarthy of Washington National Cathedral spoke highly of Teddy's vocal training and reading ability.

The advanced boy and girl Choristers were joined often during the week by teen and adult altos, tenors, and basses to sing inter-generational music for "mixed voices" in the British choral tradition. Services of Evensong and Eucharist were held at St. Mary's Church in Arlington and at the National Cathedral. We hope that Choristers may continue to represent Christ Church at RSCM Courses.

Tad Cavuoti spent a week at Duke University for the RSCM Carolina Course. Guest director Martin Baker of Westminster Cathedral led the singers through demanding and exciting repertoire. Rehearsals and seminars were held in the Duke Divinity School. Daily Evensong was celebrated in the magnificent architectural splendor of the Duke Chapel. Rockville Travels to the UK and Beyond

For a second time in the three-year lectionary cycle of readings, Tad Cavuoti's anthem O All Ye Works of God using the original hymn tune *Rockville* is being recommended by Church Music Quarterly for singing on Sunday, October 7th. This has international ramifications, as CMQ is the official journal of the Royal School of Church Music, a world-wide organization promoting understanding, energy, and high standards in choral and congregational music.

O All Ye Works of God has had an interesting journey starting in Rockville. Shortly after coming to Christ Church in 1994, Tad composed the music using the paraphrased text of the *Benedicite – A Song of Creation* by the Rev. F. Bland Tucker, onetime Rector of St. John's, Georgetown, then Christ Church, Savannah, and venerable member of the committee that produced *The Hymnal 1982*. The original form of the anthem was designed to combine the choral offering of young boy and girl Choristers, Teens, and Adults of many generations. Within a year of the first performances, submissions were being sought for a hymnal supplement, which eventually became Wonder, Love, and Praise. Tad reworked the anthem to include congregational participation and named the tune *Rockville*. For WLP, two Cavuoti compositions were chosen: "Christ Our Passover" and "O All Ye Works".

After a presentation for the Association of Anglican Musicians at their Palm Beach conference, a brass quintet accompaniment was commissioned for a New York convention of the American Guild of Organists. We were able to use this version to celebrate the 275th anniversary of our parish at an outdoor Eucharist in 2001. Then the international journey began in 2007 with the publishing of O All Ye Works simultaneously in London and Chicago through the RSCM anthology Psallam. It has been sung in festival services throughout the UK, Australia, New Zealand, and other Commonwealth nations, and across the USA, including a gathering of some 2,000 choristers (many from Rockville) in our own National Cathedral.

Ten years ago, in August of 2008, the Christ Church Choir and Choral Scholars made a musical pilgrimage to the UK. In addition to Evensongs and Eucharists, at Westminster Abbey in London and St. George's Chapel in Windsor Castle, we sang Matins (Morning Prayer), which calls for the canticle *Benedicite – A Song of Creation*. What better way to span the Atlantic than to sing an Anglican service with words and music by Americans!




