#### From the Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

On Saturday, September 13th, we gave thanks for the life of Chris Wellman, truly one of the saints of God, who departed this earthly life on July 27th at the age of 63. Several people told me that they appreciated the sermon I delivered that day, and I have decided to reproduce it here in the Angelus.



#### A Sermon Preached at the Celebration and Thanksgiving for the Life of Christopher Mark Wellman September 13, 2014

Lamentations 3:22-26,31-33

Psalm 42:1-7

Revelation 7:9-17

Matthew 25: 31-40

Someday, when I am looking back over the years of my life in ordained ministry, I will truly say that one of my greatest gifts and fulfilling joys was that of being counted as a friend by Chris Wellman. When we were discussing today's service for Chris, I told his brother Jim that one of the old traditions of the Episcopal Church is that priests do not offer eulogies at funerals – instead, they are to preach on the gift of new life in the resurrection. However, I am going to break with tradition. I will speak of resurrection life, but this <u>is</u> a eulogy, because I want us all to give thanks for how much of this wonderful man's life and witness of faith has touched all us who have known and loved him.

One of the things that many of us know about Chris is that he liked to write letters. He wrote letters to Michelle and Tim Clarke, who are serving with us today. He wrote letters to Cindy Simpson, Tad Cavuoti, Michele Craig, and Buzz and Anna Von Arx. He wrote letters to his therapists and to many other friends and acquaintances. Hand-written letters are disappearing in today's world – but they were one of Chris's primary means of communication. I don't know when Chris first wrote a letter to me, but I do know that in 2009, I felt something telling me to save them, because I was receiving two or three letters a month, sometimes weekly, and sometimes more than weekly. I have close to five years of Chris's correspondence to me, ending with the last letter he wrote on July 18th, two days before he was felled by the massive stroke that would take him from us.

I am so glad I saved these letters, because they are a veritable treasure trove – an epic narrative of the heroic spiritual journey of a soul longing for the presence of God, and so often having to battle the demons of darkness and doubt along the way. I would like to share with you some of Chris's letters, because in this way, we will have him here with us on this occasion.

There are recurring themes in Chris's writings, and one is the theme of being called to follow Christ. Here is one of my favorite letters, written in December last year, about a month after I presented Chris for the reaffirmation of his baptismal vows at the Washington Cathedral:

December 18, 2013

Dear Father McDuffie,

I was gazing out of my window early this morning at a particularly bright and beautiful star, and I began to wonder what I would actually wish for if I were given the opportunity to make a wish, and for that wish to come true. I thought about true love with a beautiful woman, but that didn't really seem to work for me. I also thought about friendship, and the possibilities of finding a friend like David found in Jonathan. That didn't seem to be it either. I put aside the idea of wishing on a star, and went back to sleep.

When I got home from my workout at Gold's Gym, the day had dawned, bright and beautiful, and I began to think again about the beautiful star in the early morning sky, and suddenly, it came to me -I wish I could be a disciple of Jesus. I think that I really needed something in my life that I could call my own - not someone else's plan or desire about how to live my life. Discipleship just seemed to satisfy a deep inner need to find something meaningful to do with my life.

Will it work out for me? I don't really know. But at least I know now what I would wish for. My wish for both of us is that we could both experience the true meaning of Christmas this year.

In my humble opinion, Chris got his wish. He <u>was</u> a disciple of Jesus, and felt that hopeful call again and again throughout his adult life. Chris was a brilliant man, with a great intellect, and a photographic memory. He was also a gifted athlete in his youth. He finished fortieth in a class of 4,000 as an undergraduate in college, and was a member of Phi Beta Kappa. He seemed destined for a life of great achievement and success. But in his early twenties, Chris suffered through the tortures of a severe mental illness that drove him to a paralyzing psychotic breakdown – a breakdown that robbed him of all of his prior scholarly and career ambitions. Through years of psychiatric hospitalization and ongoing therapy, Chris recovered enough to be able to lead a functional life, but it was a life never free from the demons of emotional illness that would assail him again and again. But in this entire painful journey, there was hopeful companionship with the suffering Christ who had called him. Listen to part of a letter that Chris wrote to me, almost a year to the day before the one I just read. Chris had been going through a trying time, and I had written him a note acknowledging that the journey in life is often difficult:

December 19, 2012

Dear Father McDuffie,

I just wanted to tell you how much I enjoyed reading the personal note you wrote me... Too often I hear well-meaning platitudes about how difficult times don't last, etc., etc., and that there will always be a happy ending to every difficult situation in life. So it's nice to hear someone acknowledge that the journey of faith is difficult, and that sometimes it is hard to see light at the end of the tunnel, when everything around you seems dark and foreboding.

My reality, I believe, is that I have chosen to follow and serve Jesus Christ, and that can lead you into some difficult and lonely places in your life. God never promises anyone an easy life, but He does promise a fulfilling life to those who take up their cross daily and follow Jesus...

We know how Chris Wellman followed Jesus and exercised his discipleship. In the community, he spent countless hours volunteering at the Rockville Nursing Home, often being a companion and friend of the friendless and lonely. He volunteered at the public library. He convened former psychiatric patients of Chestnut Lodge and facilitated dinners and social get-togethers. And here, at Christ Church, Chris made a spiritual home. He came here on a Sunday in 1986, as a shy and uncertain man, while still a patient at Chestnut Lodge. Chris told me that he sat behind

Ralph and Rita Veale, and they smiled at him, welcomed him warmly, and invited him over to dinner. Thank God for Rita and Ralph and their ministry – entertaining an angel unawares!

Through 28 years at Christ Church, Chris served as an usher, counter after Sunday services, lector at my jazz vespers services, member of the altar guild, master of ceremonies and liturgical leader at the Wednesday service at 12:10 p.m., volunteer at Lenten Luncheons, member of the Pastoral Care Committee, flower delivery volunteer, and member of our Wednesday morning Bible Study.



He was a special friend to some of our older men in the parish, including Dick Van Dyke, Ted Conway, Bob Berrien, and Mac McFadden. Chris was an ambassador for Christ.

He brought people into this community including his good friend Duncan Staley, who is ushering today. And in all that he did, Chris always outwardly manifested the light of Christ with a gentle, unassuming, humble spirit. I recall that Chris was surprised by our Fellowship Committee at our December parish dinner in 2010, on the occasion of his 60th birthday. Chris was overwhelmed by the cake presented to him, and the resounding chorus of a community that loved him, singing "Happy Birthday". He was so overwhelmed that he had to leave the dinner early! Speaking of his faith community, Chris had this to say, while again struggling through the difficult labyrinth of emotional illness, and accompanying loneliness:

September 15, 2010

Dear Father McDuffie.

...I don't know why loneliness has to happen to me, or when it will end, or why the whole process has to take so long. It just does.

I do believe that of all the places I could be in this world, the place I truly belong, for better or for worse, is at Christ Episcopal Church, Rockville, Maryland. I know that through this whole process I have mound and bitched and complained. I am definitely not the Jesus of John's Gospel. I can be small, petty, and pretty ugly. But like the Eagles say, "just find a place to make your stand and take it easy." Thank you for your prayers. We will get through this together.

Chris's life and ministry reminds me very much of a book that the late Henri Nouwen published back in the 1990's, entitled <u>The Life of the Beloved</u>. In that book, Nouwen reminds us of the fourfold shape of Jesus' last supper with his disciples, the basis for our celebration of the sacrament of Holy Communion, which was very important to Chris. At supper with his friends, Jesus <u>took</u> bread; <u>blessed</u> it; <u>broke</u> it; and <u>gave</u> it to them. Nouwen says that each of us who follow Jesus, who form the body of Christ, are taken, blessed, broken, and given in our lives.

We are taken, Nouwen says, because Christ has called us to follow him. I know that in his ardent longing for God, Chris was certainly called – that theme of vocation emerges again and again in his writings.

We are blessed. This is the hardest part of the Christian life, says Nouwen, because we are taught by the world that our identity consists of our accomplishments and our possessions. We need our degrees, our trophies, our awards, and our accolades – and we need our cars, our salaries, our houses, and our creature comforts. But Nouwen reminds us that our real identity rests in the fact that we are the beloved of God. The voice of God that spoke to Jesus at his baptism – "You are my beloved, in whom I am well-pleased" – gave the blessing that Jesus took with him into the desert to face down and triumph over the worldly temptations of success,

wealth, power, and privilege. Chris was the beloved of God, although it was a struggle for him to know this in all of his pain; and I shall say more about that in a moment.

We are broken. Jesus did not go through this human life without suffering intense pain, even unto death on the cross. Chris knew what it was to be broken. He said in his final letter to me that the two people in the Bible he most identified with were the prophet Jeremiah, who suffered mightily in his own ministry, and Jesus himself.

But finally, we are given. Our life is to be shared with others. Nouwen says that a life kept to oneself is a small life. We all know that in the midst of his challenges, Chris shared his life with us, and shared it abundantly.

Feeling the blessing and love of God was a struggle for Chris. There was certainly a great deal of anger at being struck with an illness that robbed him of potentially easier pathways to joy and happiness, and left him often feeling empty, alone, and afraid. The struggle with emptiness reminds me of another Christian saint – Mother Theresa of Calcutta – and after Chris died, I finally picked up and read a book that I had purchased seven years ago and had been reluctant to read. It is titled <a href="Come Be My Light">Come Be My Light</a>, and it is a spiritual biography of Mother Theresa, containing private letters from the days of her ministry. She was a young Serbian nun who in 1946 had a powerful unitive experience with Christ, calling her to found a new order dedicated to working with the poorest of the poor in Calcutta, India. Mother Theresa never again had such closeness with God after her first vocation, and while celebrated in the eyes of the Church and the world, she suffered an almost unceasing inner experience of emptiness and abandonment. Her spiritual director tried to help her understand that she was so identified with the suffering Christ of the cross that she was living into his agony, his thirst.

I think Chris was living in a similar spiritual realm at certain times. But there were also moments in which Chris was truly centered in knowing that he was blessed to be part of a providential plan of God. Here is another letter:

March 17, 2011

Dear Father McDuffie,

Maybe it's because I'm 60 years old now, but I was trying to think of an answer to the question, "Why are we here?" I think it's because as Christians, we all have a part to play in the larger story of God's plan of salvation for a fallen humanity. Some of us are St. Paul, while others of us are Chris Wellman and Duncan Staley. There is a great tapestry that God has woven called the human race. And there is one man, Jesus Christ, who is the answer to all the questions posed by all the great thinkers who have ever considered the meaning of life. So maybe we are here to grow into the full stature of Jesus Christ and to partake of the heavenly banquet that God has prepared for all of us who are attempting to enter the Kingdom of God. Perhaps the purpose of all our striving is to become more Christ-like in the way we relate to God and to each other. So we all have our part to play in the great drama of salvation, from the great among us to the least among us. That's all I can think as I write this letter.

Like all the great saints, Chris never knew that he was one of the greats among us. And I now deeply regret that I didn't say to Chris more often those words that Paul uttered in 1 Corinthians: "God has chosen what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God has chosen what is weak in the world to shame the strong."

A deep longing to know and love God more fully was a part of Chris's daily life. He struggled with the doctrine of the Holy Trinity. He thought of God the Father as an angry, nasty old man who enjoyed doling out punishments to whomever he arbitrarily chose to suffer – "not like the

human father I would want to know and care about". He found a strong connection with Jesus the Son, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith. In another letter from 2011, Chris wrote:

Dear Father McDuffie,

I liked what you said on Wednesday about being a friend and servant of Jesus Christ. That's about everything I aspire to be. It is sometimes hard to keep that in mind when you are going through a rough patch in your life. I will admit to being angry with God because of the painful loneliness in my life. I know that St. Paul says that "we boast in our sufferings". Paul must have been a stronger man than I am because I complain bitterly about my own suffering... Sometimes when I am in pain, it feels like an eternity, but God has brought me though a lot of pain in the past. I think He probably has a vision of what He wants for me in my life. Maybe it's just for me to be a better friend...

Chris was baffled by the Holy Spirit. He never thought that it was in his being. I was touched by a letter that he wrote to me last year:

June 30, 2013

Dear Father McDuffie,

I was sitting in my pew at Christ Church prior to the 7:45 service and looking up at the Ascension Window. I often find that contemplating the Ascension Window helps to clear my mind for the service. This morning, it seemed that Jesus looked so serene as He was being carried up into heaven. It also seemed to me at this morning's service that He was looking at His apostles that He had chosen with compassion, knowing the tribulation they would face in establishing the Church, and knowing that these were, after all, ordinary men that He had chosen to follow Him... I often feel a sense of awe and wonder when I contemplate the Ascension Window at Christ Church, when I am sitting in my pew and there are very few people around. I feel like there is a vast emptiness inside me that God will someday fill with the Holy Spirit, and I will really feel that there is a God beside me, a God above me, and finally, a God within me.

Your Friend, Chris Wellman

I couldn't help but tell Chris the next time I saw him that the Holy Spirit was emanating from him all the time!

I want to close by saying that Chris not only wrote letters; he was also a poet. Some of his poems capture the perilous and uncertain journey that he was on, but in concert with a powerful faith shining in the midst of darkness. I will read two poems, both untitled:

My mind is empty as a shell No comfort in this living hell If I had but a voice to tell How lonely life is for me still

When I lay down at night to rest I know somehow I've done my best If God has put me to the test I know somehow that I'll be blessed

There's anger in my heart, where love Has left the scars I can't remove But grace descends from heaven above And hope cries gently like a dove

A wish is like a grain of sand It sparkles gaily in the hand Of our Creator's joyful plan To lead us home to love again. The second poem relates powerful images of a journey:

Sailors search the night sky for sparkling jewels of light The stars guiding their lonely voyages To a home in every port where music and dancing Make the heart merry and the soul sing with jou The voyage of the soul seems as endless as the indigo heavens Longing for light and redeeming love A hope that seems as forlorn as a ship's empty cargo hold We hang on dearly to the illusion of the sacred While our fear overwhelms our desire To know with infinite certitude That God guides us through the storm And clasps us in His bosom forever And so we sail on, our courses yet uncharted Through the raging ocean of despair Yet our hope is not extinguished as we dare To stand alone against the roiling mob of unbelief That Siren Song of worldly pleasures Which calls us to a destiny of destruction Our hope is in Christ the Victim And Conqueror of every human fear

Dear Chris, my faithful friend and brother in Christ, with your gentle and restless spirit, we give thanks for all the goodness and loving kindness that has passed from your life into the lives of others – for your tireless, unbounded compassion, and your perseverance in faith in the midst of adversity. Your journey is over; the night has ended, the new day is here. What you once saw through a glass darkly you now see face to face. The loneliness is vanquished, and you now know fully that you are God's beloved child. What felt like an eternity of emptiness now is supplanted by a divine love that is full and complete. May we who have known and loved you be inspired by your goodness to carry on in our own journey through this mortal life, and to one day join you in that Kingdom prepared for us from before the foundation of the world.

I know those words from Shakespeare's <u>Hamlet</u> sometimes appear at moments like this – those words that Horatio said at the time of Hamlet's death – but I cannot think of anyone more appropriate for them than Chris Wellman:

Good night, sweet prince, and flights of angels sing thee to thy rest.

#### **Music at Christ Church**

#### Blessings In Worship At Christ Church

It is no small secret that our community, gathered as the congregation of Christ Episcopal Church, Rockville, has been blessed in many ways by our Creator. Certainly, the most distinctive evidence of our thank-offering for these gifts is the powerful and constant way in which we worship together on Sundays and other special occasions throughout the year. Our congregation delights in singing an enormous repertoire of hymns, psalms, and service music for the Eucharist. Very few parishes make as extensive use of the hymnal and its supplements, or have as many settings of the Communion Service (Kyrie, Gloria, Sanctus, Agnus-Dei, and their English translations) in active use.

We are also blessed with an intergenerational series of Choirs to help lead the congregation in worship, providing special anthems, harmonies, and descants, which require extra preparation and rehearsal. Our youngest boys and girls learn the basics of the Gospel story and sung worship through the guidance of Michele Craig and Craig Peters in Children's Church. In third through eighth grade, many of these boys and girls are ready to join the Choristers of Christ Church. They rehearse on Thursday afternoons, and lead the singing each Sunday at the 9:00 a.m. Eucharist. In addition, they join with the teens and adults of the Christ Church Choir on the first Sunday of the month in the musical offering of the 11:00 a.m. Eucharist. In few other areas of life can children contribute on an equal basis with adults.

The teen Choral Scholars sing on a regular schedule together with the adults of the Choir. We are blessed both with those who can read music, and those who practice their music at home with the piano or recordings. We benefit from a high level of commitment and the attention given to blend, uniformity of pronunciation, and the nuance of phrasing. We are also blessed to support a number of professional Staff Singers within the Choir. They help us to learn music in a timely fashion, providing stability and continuity from week to week. They also allow the choirs and congregation to choose from a far wider variety of music than might otherwise be possible.

Generations of generous Christ Church members have given us the blessing of exceptional instruments to support our singing and to offer beautiful music in thanksgiving during services. In 1919, we commissioned our first pipe organ from the newly established local firm of Lewis & Hitchcock. When the Christ Church building was expanded in 1965, we engaged Wayne Dirksen of the National Cathedral as consultant, and commissioned an entirely new organ from Reuter of Lawrence, Kansas to fit the new space and acoustic. As an extension of our continued maintenance of that instrument, we were able in 2002 to provide an updated console and add twelve new ranks

of pipes, increasing the organ's flexibility and variety of colorful sounds. Along the way, we have been blessed with two vintage Steinway grand pianos and a German chamber organ, for which we provide regular tuning and maintenance.

In these and many other ways, we have been blessed at Christ Church and are able to offer musical thanks to God in a most extraordinary manner.

#### New Spain Comes To Old Rockville

We are also blessed in being able to offer choral Mass settings as part of the monthly musical cycle at Christ Church. On Sunday, October 5<sup>th</sup> at the 11:00 a.m. Eucharist, the Choristers and Choir will sing the Missa Ego Flos Campi by the Mexican colonial composer Juan Gutiérrez de Padilla.

PADILLA (1590-1664) was born in Malaga, Spain, and was one of several composers who moved to Spanish America, where he became music director at the Cathedral in Puebla. There, the musical establishment was the richest in the Spanish Empire outside of Spain itself, with a choir of 28 men and 14 boys, and instruments such as the harp, organ, and bassoon to accompany. Padilla's compositions are in a conservative style, but have certain distinctive and lively rhythms common to folk dance on both sides of the Atlantic. To describe this in another way, his music starts out sounding like the serene polyphony of Palestrina or Victoria, but soon evolves into the energetic syncopations associated with Spanish folk songs. The Kyrie, Sanctus, & Agnus Dei to be sung on October 5th are for "double choir", with two complete Soprano, Alto, Tenor, and Bass ensembles singing to each other across the center aisle.

To complement this delightful Hispanic music, our Choirs and Congregation will join in singing Psalm 80 to a Gregorian chant with the accompaniment of hand bells. The anthem will be a setting of the hymn "Christ is made the sure foundation" with text by John Mason Neale and music commissioned by Church of the Ascension, Sligo Parish from our own music director Tad Cavuoti. The communion motet will be "Bread of Heaven" with music by former Kings Singers tenor Bill Ives.

#### Church Musicians' Retreat At Claggett

For two days last week, I was fortunate to be able to join fifty of my colleagues, organists, and choir directors at the Bishop Claggett Center in Buckeystown, Maryland for worship, exchanging ideas, and celebrating the ministry that is ours in the Church. The keynote address was given by John Walker, President of the American Guild of Organists, and former Director of Music at the Riverside Church in New York City. This was followed by Evensong in St. Andrew's Chapel where the singing was nothing short of tremendous. I had the honor of directing the Anglican chant Psalm, especially to help those who are less experienced in this Episcopal/Anglican form of Psalm singing. We then retired to the deck of one of the cottages for refreshments and informal talk.

The following morning we had an invigorating warm-up session with Stephen Holmes, Director of the Maryland State Boychoir and Organist at Church of the Resurrection. He led us through an amazing variety of vocal exercises, offering tips for improving breath support, enunciation, and beauty of tone. Richard Van Auken then demonstrated creative ways of introducing and accompanying hymns. A few of his examples were perilously close to "over the top", but were delightful and inspiring nonetheless. The retreat ended with a reading session led by my friend and colleague Peter Crisafulli, Minister of Music at All Saints', Chevy Chase. He had arranged a series of anthems following the church calendar from Advent through Epiphany, Lent, Easter, Pentecost, and Trinity, with small choirs especially in mind.

This retreat takes place in an idyllic setting, perfect for inspiration as we embark on a new season of sacred music making.


In the past, Christ Church, in partnership with Stop Hunger Now, has prepared meal packets for over 145,000 children worldwide living in remote locations with few resources. Stop Hunger Now (rated 3/4 stars, "good" by Charity Navigator) is a U.S.-based nonprofit hunger relief organization that supports both disaster response and transformational development programs (e.g. vocational training and early childhood development). The meals provided are easily stored and transported, shelf-stable, and nutritious. In a few hours, Christ Church volunteers assemble thousands of meal packets that are delivered to places of need worldwide. Christ Church has been a leader among Maryland churches in support of this effort, with participants of all ages and generations making the event a highlight of our Outreach Ministry.

A key to the success of Stop Hunger Now Saturday is that it is organized as an efficient and family-friendly enterprise, with roles for every age and ability. Children and teens work alongside their parents, grandparents, and peers in a cooperative setting, where the work of our hands connects us all with our sisters and brothers all over our planet. It's also great fun!




