The Interim's Corner



Last month I talked about the two major tasks of the Interim Rector: (1) to function as rector of the parish until shortly before the new rector arrives and (2) to prepare the leadership and congregation for the arrival of the new rector.

Functioning as Rector are times of joy and challenge. This month was filled with listening to many of the stories of Christ Church members, presiding over two Celebrations of lives well lived, leading the vestry through, and pastorally being present with, the choir through the difficult departure of Christ Church's long time Director of Music and Organist, Tad Cavuoti.

Preparing the leadership and congregation for the arrival of the new rector also brings joy and challenge because it involves change as part of preparation. Stephen Gilligan says, "People do not want to be changed, they want to be blessed." And Rob Voyle says, "When we really receive God's blessing with open arms we can't help but to be changed!"

So, I always invite congregations to look at change as a blessing. In an Interim time, it is especially important to look at change as a blessing as you prepare for your rector who is to come. Because whoever he or she is, they will come excited with new ideas. They will want to try things. And so right now we are practicing for what it will be like when she or he arrives.

This month we have begun to explore one of my Interim charges, to help you look at new and alternative ways of "doing" ministry together in the areas of worship and stewardship. I am so proud of how our Stewardship Committee has discerned what they value about the past stewardship programs and are also trying some new things at the same time. They, and I hope, that some of these new things will provide you with another way to see how God blesses so that you might be transformed in your generosity and to step up in your giving.

In worship we have begun to explore some things too. Jason has begun and will continue to introduce some service music from the Hymnal 1982. We have introduced a standing station at the foot of the stairs in the Nave, at our 9:00 and 11:00 services. This is a sign of Christ Church's hospitality for any who choose to receive Eucharist there instead of going to the altar rail. We are working diligently to keep our 9:00 service to one hour in length, so that children, youth formation, and adult forums may maximize the opportunity to learn and grow in Christ Jesus.

7:45 and 11:00 services remain unchanged. At 9:00 we are using Enriching Our Worship (EOW). While this is not entirely new to Christ Church, only the Eucharist Prayer has been used in the past. We are now using the Service of the Word of the Rite as well. EOW is shorter than Rite II and will help us meet our goal to keep the service to one hour. EOW uses more expansive images and metaphors in worship as well. As past Presiding Bishop Frank Griswold said, "Expanding our vocabulary of prayer and the ways in which we name the Holy One bear witness to the fact that the mystery of God transcends all categories of knowing, including those of masculine and feminine." We will be using this service as a trial through December at the 9:00 service. Your new rector may want to use this Anglican liturgy as well.

Finally, I look forward to beginning to help forming you as leaders and members of Christ Church. I invite you to come to the upcoming Adult Forums about Church Size on October 7 and 14. You will learn about how church size impacts how churches function and how it impacts attracting new members, interactions with your rector, and more. I hope to see you there!!

Loaves and Fishes

Loaves and Fishes is a program that serves a mid-day meal to between 100-200 people who otherwise would not have a hot meal. Based in St. Stephen and the Incarnation in the District, the program was started in 1968 after riots devastated that part of the city. It runs on weekends and holidays when many other feeding programs are not available. A generous donor set up a trust to buy the chicken which is a staple of the meals they provide because he thought that more protein was needed for people in poverty. His teenage grandson still volunteers there occasionally. Some of the regular helpers are people who were formerly clients of the program and are now giving back. A social service program, Thrive DC, uses the kitchen during the week for their feeding program.

For over 20 years, every third Sunday and on each Labor Day, members of Christ Church have carpooled to St. Stephen and the Incarnation to help with Loaves and Fishes. We leave about 10:15 a.m. and return about 1:00 p.m. The Eucharist is brought to us as we serve so that we are fed with the Body and Blood of Christ as we help carry out his command of "Feed my sheep." Our main duty there is plating the meals, although some people help prep, serve, and clean up. We are always welcome to speak with the patrons. We share our time slot with St. Luke's in Bethesda. Christ Church, through the Outreach Committee, provides some monetary assistance, as well. Volunteers are always needed. The Outreach Committee meets the second Tuesday of each month from 7:30 p.m. – 8:30 p.m. in the Parish House beside the church. The next Committee meeting will be October 9^{th} . Rise Against Hunger!

Our annual Rise Against Hunger event will take place in the Parish Dining Room on Saturday, November 17th from 10:00 a.m. – Noon. Plan to arrive a little early to get registered and settled in for this great event!

Formerly named Stop Hunger Now, the Rise Against Hunger event has been a fantastic expression of outreach within our church each year. We typically have about 60 people show up and package more than 15,000 meals in the two hour period, and the group represents a great cross-section of church parishioners'.

Rise Against Hunger is an international hunger relief organization that distributes food and life-changing aid to the world's most vulnerable, mobilizing the necessary resources to end hunger by 2030. The meals we packed last year were sent to Madagascar, and we received the following information about that shipment:

A shipping container, holding 287,064 meals, has been sent to Madagascar for our partner Adventist Development and Relief Agency, which is an organization that nourishes lives through food assistance and other services in Madagascar. Environmental Stewardship

Christ Episcopal Church and School met on September 11th to discuss recent problems with contamination of recyclable materials with non-recyclable items. These problems have resulted in three recent, substantial fines from Waste Management, the sanitation service provider for the church and school. Following up on the meeting, please keep the following in mind, both at church and home (provided by Waste Management):

Focus on Recycling Quality –

The Do's and Don'ts of Recycling

The recycling industry is experiencing high levels of contamination – trash in the recycling – at a time when the requirements for quality (clean recycling) are increasing due to new policies in China.

Earlier this year, China began to limit the quality and quantity of material it accepts for recycling, impacting the recycling industry world-wide. As a result, our focus on quality is higher than ever, as we work to ensure the long-term sustainability of our recycling programs.

When non-recyclable items (contamination) end up in your recycling, they have the potential to turn the entire load into trash, resulting in contamination or additional service charges.

IMPORTANT: Under your service terms, you may be assessed contamination charges of up to \$69.00 per yard (based on the size of your recycling container) for excess contamination found in your container during recycling collection.

So, we want to provide you with tools for success.


Recycling Do's



 Do recycle all empty bottles,* cans, paper and cardboard.




 Do keep foods and liquids out of recycling.

Don't include food-soiled items

 they can turn an entire load of recycling into trash.



 Don't add sharp or dangerous materials like needles and electronics – they can cause injury to our workers.



 Don't toss in "tanglers" like rubber hoses and wires – they can shut down an entire recycling center!



 Don't include bulky items like propane tanks or construction debris.


