# transforming generosity

Dear followers of Christ,

Presiding Bishop Michael Curry often describes us as “The Episcopal branch of the Jesus movement.”

As we begin to talk about stewardship of our parish and wider community, I want to pose these questions: What does that mean for us? What is God calling us to do as followers of Jesus?

As Episcopalians, we love our worship. Our liturgies inspire us. The Eucharist is at the center of our lives. We believe the Bible is the Word of God and we are people of the Word.

As part of the Jesus movement, we follow the One who loves us so much that he gave his life so that we might understand God’s never-ending love for all of creation.

And here’s the hard part: As followers of Jesus, we are called to give all of ourselves to God’s work in the world. In the sixth chapter of Matthew’s Gospel, Jesus, after teaching us how to pray, talks to us about money, our needs and our hope. He reminds us that we cannot have two masters. We cannot love God and money.

Jesus then says:

“Therefore, I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothes? Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life?”

He finishes by calling each of us with these words, “But seek first God’s kingdom and God’s righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well.”

How would our church - how would we - be transformed if each of us remembered these words of Jesus? We are indeed called to set new priorities.

Establishing new priorities for ourselves and for our church means transforming how we think about generosity. That transformation will call upon us to look for generosity in every aspect of our work and in every aspect of our lives. Remember the tenth chapter of Mark’s Gospel: “Jesus, looking at the man, loved him and said, ‘You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me.’”

Jesus calls us to take the long view. Again, he challenges us to give all of ourselves to God’s righteousness and trust in God’s care. What a challenge! What transformation!

One of my spiritual practices is to return 10%, a tithe, of my income to God. I recognize that all I have comes from God and giving in this way has transformed my life. I hope you will consider joining me in this practice this year as we work together to transform generosity in our church, our community and our lives.

## How to Give?

### **It's easy...read on!!!**

In order for Christ Church to fulfill its mission, it has to have sufficient income for the basics which are outlined in the budget. Sure, there is ministry included in the budget, however, another way to help us each to decide just how much we will contribute is to think of the church's budget as our written statement of the limits we intend to put on our work for the Kingdom of God for the coming year.

Some of us just don't pledge but do contribute when the plate is passed on Sunday...the "Pay per View" approach. To be sure, plate offerings are appreciated, and the money is needed. The challenge is that plate offerings cannot be used in planning the church's budget and ministries. We encourage you to give pledging a try this year.

So, assuming that, after family discussion and prayer, an amount to give as a pledge has been determined. How do we give it? Each church member, or family, that makes a pledge has an envelope number assigned to them (even if envelopes are not requested). Unless otherwise requested, family contributions are combined and recorded as one. All financial gifts from family members are entered using the assigned envelope number. Combining a family's contribution to one envelope number opens a way to begin teaching financial stewardship to children. Let them participate by placing their own money into an envelope that has the family's number on it.

Here are some ways to fulfill your pledge:

- Write a check. Place it in the offering plate, a traditional method.
- Cash is still accepted! Be sure it is in an envelope with your pledge number on it.
- Automatic payments from your bank to the church. Ask your bank to set it up for you.
- Online giving is very easy. Go to <http://www.christchurchrockville.org/> and choose "eGiving" in the top banner. There you will find ways to fulfill your pledge or make other financial contributions to Christ Church (such as to the school's capital campaign).
- Credit card automatic payment. Christ Church does not encourage creating credit card debt but does recognize that many of us do take advantage of the many perks offered by credit card companies for using their services. Yes, there is a cost to Christ Church when credit cards are used. Please consider increasing your credit card gift by 4% so the church enjoys 100% of the budgeted pledge amount!
- Minimum Required Distribution (MRD) of your 401k retirement plan. Instruct your financial institution to send your MRD directly to Christ Church. That way it never touches your hands and is not a taxable event for you. Be sure to talk to your accountant about this! Gary Correll, [gcorrell@verizon.net](mailto:gcorrell@verizon.net), should be notified that an MRD is coming to the church for all or part of your pledge. The check from your institution should be made out to "The Vestry of Prince George's Parish, Christ Episcopal Church."
- Appreciated stock is another way to fulfill your pledge with non-taxed dollars. Again, get advice from your accountant before you do this.

As long as you and your loved ones are talking about giving, bring up the subject of a will! A will is not normally thought of as a way of pledge fulfilment. Nevertheless, naming your church as a beneficiary is a statement of your commitment to the continuing of the ministries of Christ Church. Chances are that about 50% of us reading this do not have a will and that about half of those of us that do have a will have not updated it to fit our current circumstances. For your family's sake, if you don't have an up-to-date will, please get one!

Finally, one the easiest ways to make a legacy gift is to name your Christ Church as a beneficiary of your life insurance! In our Episcopal tradition, the liturgy for the dead is an Easter liturgy. It finds all meaning in the resurrection. What a better way to give a gift of new life than through a legacy gift by naming Christ Church in your will or life insurance?

### **Christ Church Search Committee Update**

After eight months and twenty-three meetings, the Search Committee – following the Episcopal Diocese of Washington's Standard Process for Transition of Parish Clergy – has completed its task.

The names of our top three candidates have been forwarded in ranked order to the Vestry. The search process, although arduous at times, has culminated in our selection of these extremely viable and well-qualified candidates – any one of which will lift our spirits and move our church in the right direction.

Thanks to you, the congregation, for your support, prayers and patience during this process, and for your tremendous response during our self-assessment phase where you provided critical input at our focus groups.

Now, the Vestry will take the reins, conducting the final interviews and on-site visits here at our church, and will thoughtfully and prayerfully discern which of the three candidates will be the new rector of Christ Episcopal Church.

### **Rise Against Hunger!**

Our annual Rise Against Hunger event will take place in the Parish Dining Room on Saturday, November 17<sup>th</sup> from 10:00 a.m. – Noon. Plan to arrive a little early to get registered and settled in for this great event!

Formerly named Stop Hunger Now, the Rise Against Hunger event has been a fantastic expression of outreach within our church each year. We typically have about 60 people show up and package more than 15,000 meals in the two hour period, and the group represents a great cross-section of church parishioners.

Rise Against Hunger is an international hunger relief organization that distributes food and life-changing aid to the world's most vulnerable, mobilizing the necessary resources to end hunger by 2030. The meals we packed last year were sent to Madagascar, and we received the following information about that shipment:

A shipping container, holding 287,064 meals, has been sent to Madagascar for our partner Adventist Development and Relief Agency, which is an organization that nourishes lives through food assistance and other services in Madagascar. ### **Bishop Mariann Budde Visits!!!**





### **Reflections on September's Adult Forum – Lois Wye Speaking on Dominion in the Image of God**

We are so thankful that Lois Wye came to speak to our Church. Those who attended enjoyed an interesting, thought-provoking, and elevating presentation. Lois has shared with us her presentation so that we may share some of it with you.

Portions from her presentation:

I want to start with what might strike you as a fairly startling proposition: That caring for animals is not just an *appropriate*



And God said, Let Us make man in Our image, according to Our likeness; and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of heaven and over the cattle and over all the earth and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth.  
Gen. 1:26

Christian concern, I believe it is *fundamental* to what it means to be human, what it means to be created in God's image, and what it means to carry out God's will on earth.

In the creation stories, God creates all the creatures and pronounces each of them good before humans are created, so their value to God cannot depend solely on their relationship to humans.

Looking beyond the creation stories, scripture also tells us that God covenants with the animals (Gen. 9:9-17 and Hosea 2:18), that the animals praise God (Psalms, e.g., 33, 50, 104, 150), and that God loves and cares for them (Psalms, Job, Numbers 22:28-33, Jonah 4:11, Matthew 10:29).

So, where does that leave us as creatures uniquely created in God's image?

[S]cholars have begun to reexamine what it means to be created in God's image in the context of the scriptures and in the context of the ancient cultures in which they were written. It is now nearly unanimously agreed by them that to be created in God's likeness and image was intended to convey the idea that we are created with the power and purpose to *reflect* God's image, God's *character*, into the world. This is similar to the practice of ancient rulers, who would often place statues in areas of their realm they couldn't get to personally. Those images were intended to remind people who their ruler was.

So, being created in God's image does not convey *status*, it imposes *responsibility*. And this changes everything in our understanding of dominion, doesn't it? Suddenly, the other creatures are not created to meet our needs; instead, we are charged with reflecting the mercy and love of God to them. We are to "attest to and enact" God's character for the animals. This is consistent with the whole of scripture: wherever God gives power He gives responsibility.

I argue that our *value* comes from the fact that we are *loved* by God – just like all the other creatures. Our *importance* (not status) comes from the *responsibilities* we have been given, which means we had better be serious about fulfilling them.

But let's pause a moment to notice that our exercise of dominion goes expressly to the *animals*, not species, not natural resources, not the earth, not the environment. To the animals – whom God knows as individuals, just as He does you and me – not one sparrow falls without the Father. Of course, we have obligations to care for the environment that scripture speaks to eloquently, but we are created in God's image so that we can have dominion over the *animals* – it is a particular responsibility, because unlike species and resources and environments, animals are not just live, they *have lives*. They can suffer and they can rejoice. We are not just stewards protecting a resource, we are representatives, reflecting love and compassion and mercy.

I think that when we care for animals we are usually also caring for humans. Consider [the following]:

- When we nurture compassion and humanity, we can prevent violence against both humans and animals, because studies show those are linked.
- When we change our diets so as not to support factory farming, we stop underwriting cruelty to animals, massive sources of pollution, overuse of antibiotics which threatens public health, and terrible working conditions for humans that often result in PTSD.
- When we care for the planet we care not just for the animals' habitat, but for our own.


