From the Rector

Goodnight, John Boy.

Of course, this is how The Walton's always ended. As the lights were going off in the home on Walton's Mountain, the family would bid one another goodnight. We were goofy enough to participate in a similar evening ritual, albeit not using our names, but the names of all of the Waltons in that house. There were more of them, so we could carry on with this a little longer than my parents appreciated. To be clear, I, of course, never instigated it.

The pilot of this classic series was entitled "The Homecoming: A Christmas Story". It takes place in 1933, during the Great Depression. John Walton, the patriarch, has gone to the big city to find a job. He promises his family that he will be home for Christmas. So, he has an anxious family awaiting his return on Christmas Eve as a blizzard rages on Walton's Mountain. Finally, Ma sends out John-Boy, as the eldest child, to find his daddy who is caught in the storm. Of course, he finds his daddy and brings him home in time to celebrate Christmas with the family. It all ends well.

It is said that you can never truly come home again. The people we have left have changed in place, even though it may not seem that way. And, the place changes as well. Time and circumstances do that to both. And, of course, those of us who have departed from our homes change as well.

No one is like an insect in amber, preserved in place and position for all of eternity.

But, I don't believe that it is impossible to come home again, if we are willing to accept that home, and those there, aren't exactly as we have left them. God created us to live the gift of our lives, and didn't expect that we would forever remain the same, or that those around us would, either. In fact, God constantly wishes and wills us to change for the better to live into our baptismal covenants.

That all said, there is one thing that never changes, and that is God. In God's effort to encourage us to change for the better, He constantly invites us to come home to Him. We all receive that invitation in different ways, and see different doors and windows that lead to the Divine.

In a place of worship, those doors and windows often are held for us by our fellow pilgrims on the road to God. Look for those who encourage and support your efforts to journey toward the changeless One in whom you can rest, and live. The One who is our home.

It is during this season of Advent that we engage in what is known as active waiting. There is work to do. Just as the Waltons continued to prepare for their Christmas dinner while awaiting the return of their Pa, we must prepare our hearts for the arrival of the Christ child. The season of Advent is the beginning of our liturgical calendar. We have four weeks to prepare our hearts to receive the gift that the Christ child brings to us. What if we were to do a little bit of work every day to make our hearts a rich garden in which love can be sowed and harvested?

The evangelist Matthew wrote, "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." Our greatest treasure is found in relationship with God. As we travel to God, our journey

brings us closer to our true selves, as Herman Hesse wrote, "each man's life represents a road to himself." And, our relationship with God is our true center, our true home.

Home is where the heart is. Come home for Christmas.

An Update on the Christ Church Outreach Program

"Foxes have dens, and birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head" – Matthew 8:20

Many of you have heard about Habitat for Humanity, the program that helps families build their own home. One of Habitat's most famous "builders" is Jimmy Carter. Christ Episcopal Church is considering partnering with Habitat for Humanity in the local area. No decisions have been made, but we wanted to give you some thoughts to consider.

With your help, it may be possible for Christ Church to be "builders" right here in our own community. Our local affiliate, Habitat for Humanity Metro Maryland, is looking for groups such as Christ Church to provide some of the work necessary to build or restore a home.

So, what kind of work do volunteers do? When Emily and Gary Correll lived in Georgia some time ago, they painted, dug footings, and nailed together studs. Oh, and made sandwiches, loads of sandwiches! On a recent Habitat build in Honduras, Mary Belknap threw plaster on interior walls, guided by Ernesto, the master builder. She's happy to report that after a week of practice, her plaster job looked quite professional.

Habitat doesn't give away the homes. Rather, it creates a three-legged stool of partnerships: a family needing a home who puts in many hours of sweat equity to build their home; volunteers who help the family by doing some of the construction; and a locally run Habitat program which lends the family money for the mortgage.

To participate, Habitat asks that we, as a church, engage both by providing a financial donation and by helping physically to work on a home. Donations go to providing volunteers with instruction and guidance from professional builders, as well as supporting the work of the local Habitat affiliate. Volunteer work is typically on the weekends. Last year, our local Habitat helped 30 families to either move into a new home or stay in a home they already owned.

The reason we are thinking about this is that we think it is important to live our faith by helping others. Building stable local communities and making sure families have homes helps all of us. Potential Christ Church budgetary constraints may limit our financial involvement. Again, no decisions have been made, but stay tuned as this idea is considered.

The Outreach Committee September meeting will take place on Wednesday, December 11th from 7:30 p.m. – 8:30 p.m. in the Parish House beside the church. 

Environmentally Sound Gift Alternatives

The holiday season is upon us! For children's gifts and party favors, please consider alternatives to plastic toys.

- 1. Plastic toys are usually not recyclable and end up in a landfill.
- 2. Children often lose interest in them after a short time and the toys are quickly discarded or break.
- 3. Toys can be enjoyed longer if they are durable, which most plastic toys aren't.
- 4. Plastic (and other) toys can come with an exorbitant amount of packaging, which also ends up in the landfill.
- 5. The manufacturing process for plastic toys and packaging can create pollution and contribute to greenhouse gases.
- 6. Plastic toys commonly contain chemicals, including phthalates, which have been linked to several different health issues. Young children are at an increased risk because they frequently put toys in their mouths.
- 7. Many plastic toys take up lots of space and might not fit comfortably into the space the family has available.
- 8. Instead of giving plastic toys, please consider giving children experiences (trip to the zoo or a show) that you can enjoy together, creating lasting memories.

In the twenty years that I have been a member of CEC, I have taught Sunday School (12 years), served on CES's Board of Trustees and founded and led Faithful Professionals CEO, God (5 years). During that same time, Ι worked full time as а business/employment/litigation attorney and with my husband Mark, raised Casey and Garrett (who were both involved in choir, Youth Group and the acolyte program). Besides being a wife, mother and fulltime lawyer, I am trained and licensed to teach Zumba Fitness (B1&B2), Zumba Gold, Zumba Toning and Zumba Kids & Kids Jr.

Why did I get licensed to teach all of these Zumba programs, with everything else I have going on in my life? I was facing a serious dilemma: I needed to exercise for both my physical and mental well-being, but I hate traditional workouts and resented spending my precious time doing something I dreaded. I love to dance, but opportunities to dance (weddings?) are limited. I found the perfect solution: Zumba Fitness. Zumba is a Latin/international music dance fitness program that takes the *work* out of workouts. "*Research suggests that it may be the very best workout for people who hate to exercise.*" (See attached articles regarding benefits of Zumba from Time Magazine's Special Edition, *The Science of Exercise*, 2018 and other magazines.) It's a dance party!

The Zumba Gold program is a low impact version of Zumba Fitness. The classes are structured to accommodate beginners, older persons and individuals with physical limitations. I was motivated to seek my Zumba Gold instruction license after my mother fell twice in two years breaking both of her hips. She is now in a wheelchair completely dependent on my father who has severe arthritis throughout his body. Had they known what we know now about the importance of exercise to prevent brittle bones and degenerative joints, they might have had an opportunity to enjoy my father's late in life retirement. Their quality of life is significantly diminished due to their physical limitations and pain.

I am offering to teach a Zumba Gold class to help people find health and happiness by wiggling, shaking and shimmying with old and new friends. For those who are familiar with Zumba Fitness or already physically fit, the Zumba Gold class will offer variations of moves and options to keep you engaged, challenged and smiling.
