From the Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

New Year greetings to one and all as we come into 2017. I hope that you all have had a blessed and fulfilling Christmas, and that the joyful remembrance of Christ's incarnation in the world may now extend into our daily, ongoing realization that we are jointly the body of Christ, engaged in his work of reconciliation for the hope of the world.

After Christmas and winter solstice feasting and celebrating, January is a time for reflection and planning. Maybe you have made a few New Year's resolutions. I can report that every year in early January, I see a sudden new and increased influx of people, dressed out in new sweat togs, at the fitness center where I work out. (The phenomenon is usually not sustained!). In January, I like to remind us all of the rubric that appears on p. 445 of our Book of Common Prayer:

The Minister of the Congregation is directed to instruct the people from time to time, about the duty of Christian parents to make prudent provision for the well-being of their families, and of all persons to make wills, while they are in health, arranging for the disposal of their temporal goods, not neglecting, if they are able, to leave bequests for religious and charitable purposes.

I cannot say it any better than the Prayer Book. It is an element of good and faithful stewardship that we do good planning with the resources we have, for the benefit of those whom we love. And the last clause invites us to consider the question: "Could I make a bequest to Christ Church in my will?" If you love this church, might you consider planning for a gift that keeps on giving? In my time at Christ Church, we received a generous bequest from the estate of our parishioner Katherine Thomas, which became the occasion for the formation of the Christ Church Endowment Fund. We only spend from the interest income from our Endowment, and the money is used for various capital improvement projects and special ministry initiatives not included in our regular operating budget. We have also received special bequests from other parishioners. These funds go either in to the Endowment, or a special savings fund we have that has similar usage provisions as the Endowment. Occasionally, a bequest comes along at just the right moment for a special project to be realized. For instance, some years back, a bequest from the estate of Jack Oxley came to us just as we were realizing the need for a new church interior security system, and a new computer network for our staff. Jack's gift was a Godsend!

While I'm talking about gifts that make a significant difference in our ministry, I want to mention another opportunity to give at Christ Church.

Clergy Discretionary Funds

Both Cindy Simpson and I have discretionary funds that enable us to provide for special pastoral care needs of individuals and families. Sometimes, people come to us from outside Christ Church, and we are able to help them with special needs in crisis situations. More often, however, we also help parishioners in difficult circumstances. Christ Church budgets small amounts of money each year to help with these funds. But we also gratefully receive gifts from time to time from members of the church. Discretionary Funds are to be used strictly for charitable purposes, according to guidelines established by the Internal Revenue Service. They are not for the personal enjoyment or benefit of the clergy. Each fund is audited annually by a member of the church, to insure that the fund is being used appropriately. At this time, Cindy and I are both assisting individuals and families who have longer-term needs for support, so your generous gifts mean a lot! – and genuinely make a critical difference in the lives of people whom we love and who are in need. To make a gift of this kind, simply write a check to Christ Church and earmark it either for the Rector's Discretionary Fund, or the Assistant Rector's Discretionary Fund. Thanks to one and all who help support vital ministries in this way!

Our fall financial stewardship campaign officially ended on November 20th of this past year. Inside Outreach An Update on the Christ Church Outreach Program

Community Ministries of Rockville (CMR) has a mission of improving the quality of life for the most vulnerable Montgomery County residents. CMR provides various services including the Kaseman Health Clinic, the Rockville Emergency Assistance Program, Elderly Ministries, Language Outreach, a Housing Program, Advocacy, and Holiday Giving.

For over 10 years Christ Church has supported CMR. Currently Outreach sets aside some \$13,000 to help CMR run their Clinic, their homecare program for the elderly and two permanent supportive housing programs. CMR also provides holiday meals and holiday gifts for low-income families. In addition, CMR runs a large English as a Second Language program, serving some 450 adults and children. This year they expanded the program to include an English Conversation class, in addition to their traditional grammar-based program. We are proud to say that Emily Correll and Mary Belknap helped CMR to develop this program, carrying out one of the core values of our Outreach Committee, to leverage the time and talent of Christ Church members to help people beyond our walls.

Environmental Stewardship

In October, we had an informative conference call with Lauren Greenspan of CPA (Community Purchasing Alliance). She explained how the church can save money by allowing CPA to "bundle" our needs with other churches, thus getting a cheaper

rate for services that include energy, trash, security, copiers, janitorial supplies, and office supplies. A contract has been submitted that will be discussed at the December meeting.

The Group has received the revised energy audit. Mark Wright and Janice Musselman are studying it prior to our December meeting and before presenting it to the Vestry.

The office is now using recycled paper for much of our publications. The weekly bulletin is now printed on 30% recycled paper. Other notices are printed on either 50% or 100% recycled paper. Barbara Hunt-Wolper and Ruth Hanessian put up an attractive and informative bulletin board in the church dining room. It contains interesting information on activities of the Environmental Stewardship Group.

Meet Our Volunteers



The term Bargain Box Volunteer is synonymous with the Wolohojian family. Donna is currently the Manager of the

Bargain Box. But it all started almost 20 years ago, when Donna, Jess, and Dan (and sometimes George) worked the front desk on the first Saturday morning of each month. Nellilew Quay and Helen Mahon worked the afternoon shift. One day, Nellilew and Hellen came in and Dan and Jess complained that they hadn't had enough turns on the cash register so they volunteered to stay the rest of the day. The Wolohojian family has worked the whole first Saturday of the month ever since. After Cai Conway passed away in 2004, and Nellilew was retiring, Donna took on the job of Manager. While a list of her duties would fill more than this issue of *The Angelus*, she has been responsible for the move to the current location, the expansion of both space and content, and the modernization and standardization of most of the processes and procedures that have resulted in the wellorganized (for an entirely volunteer organization, anyway) operation that is the Bargain Box today. As Donna says "This IS her day job," but she also walks in several cancer walks, reads, and roots for the New England Patriots. For several years, George has tested all the appliances that were donated, but when he retired from the federal government, he started the "Hardware and Electronics" department in the store and sorts and prices all those items. From about the age of 10, when she and Dan used to fight over the cash register, the Bargain Box has been part of Jess' life.

Donna likes the variety of people who are customers, from all walks of life, from all over the world. Jess enjoys the fun volunteers and the novelty of never knowing what donations will be waiting in the donation room to be priced. George likes the fact that he gets to work with so many fun-loving ladies and since guys are outnumbered ten-to-one, it makes him feel like a chick magnet! The Wolohojians have been members of Christ Episcopal Church since the early 1980's. The family has been active in Youth Group and as ushers, and George is a past Senior Warden. Donna is most proud of the store's outreach mission (since 1957!) and recent growth. The total donated this year: \$26,450. "Also, the staff of volunteers" is a fun, hardworking, diverse and dedicated group. Many are friends and neighbors of parishioners, a few are customers and consignors who've been "promoted". You've met them in this page of the Angelus. But same as when we started in the 1990's, the store continues to be shorthanded at the front desk. I would invite anyone in the congregation to come in for a quick tour and explanation of how we can use your time and talent. The shift is only three hours, the perks are great, and the snack drawer is well stocked. "

The Bargain Box will be closed December 24th, 25th, and 26th and also December 31st, January 1st and 2nd.

Who Are Our Customers?

Our customers come from all walks of life and from all over the world. It doesn't take long to learn who the "regulars" are but we still get new customers who find us on the internet or people moving into town center. They run the gamut - a woman who is hoping to retire soon to her WVA farm house and decorating / furnishing it with shabby chic from the BB; a woman whose church gathers clothing to send to Nicaragua shops our clearance racks several times a month; an MC art student who walks to and from the metro and always leaves extra time to stop in before or after class; free clothing clients who are able to find outfits for a job interview or for their kids; and a lawyer who spilled lunch on his shirt and tie and ran in to buy a new set before heading back to court.
