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#### From the Rector



Fr. McDuffie

Dear Friends in Christ,

This is my last letter for the <u>Angelus</u>. I thought and thought about what I wanted to say to you, the church family I've had the privilege of being with and serving these past nineteen and a half years. I thought about sharing notable memories – but there were too many, and maybe I will do some of that in the Adult Forum I'm leading on January 14<sup>th</sup>. So before offering a simple valediction, let me mention three things that are on my mind.

- 1) Please make sure you make a financial pledge to Christ Church for 2018. If you love this church, and have found something that has been good for your life in this place, you can help maintain its strength and vitality in coming days. Don't say to yourself, "Somebody else will have to bear the weight of supporting the budget, and not me." I pray that my successor in ministry will be wise, gifted, and commissioned to bring a creative new pair of eyes, ears, and hands to serve. The more stable the church is financially, the more attractive it will be to a capable priest who may be discerning a new call to ministry. We are a church in transition, with many older members moving on, and newer individuals coming in. There may be a shortfall in anticipated pledge income for 2018, so everybody is important in supporting the life of the parish.
- 2) I hope a lot of you will come to Jazz Vespers on Sunday, January 21<sup>st</sup> at 5:00 p.m. I started this service ten years ago, after my 2007 sabbatical. Jazz is a wonderful experiment in how the Holy Spirit can inspire spontaneous, hitherto unimagined moments of creativity. This is our last offering, and it will benefit Community Ministries of Rockville. We had a splendid attendance at our December 3<sup>rd</sup> service, raising over \$1000 for Interfaith Works, and I hope that we can do something similar for our friends at CMR.
- 3) Sunday, January 28<sup>th</sup>, is my last service just one that morning, at 10:00 a.m., followed by a farewell reception. There is a theme in the scriptural lessons I have chosen for the day, and it is "the love of Christ in community".

And now, a valediction. We will bid one another "Good-bye" (God be with you) on January 28<sup>th</sup>. At farewells, I'm invariably reminded of the song "Some Other Time" by Leonard Bernstein, Adolph Comden, and Betty Green, from the musical <u>On the Town</u>. Some of the lyrics:

Where has the time all gone to, Haven't done half the things we want to, Oh well... we'll catch up, some other time Just when the party's starting Comes the time for parting But let's be glad for what we've had And what...is to come.

Of course, we won't catch up some other time, in the way that we have known each other over the years. But at the same time, there is really no farewell. Wherever I go, wherever I am in the remainder of my days, I will carry Christ Church with me in my heart. And if my ministry has been a welcome part of your life, I hope that wherever you go, you will also carry me with you. Love never dies, and that is one of the great truths of our faith. "Nothing good ever ends", says Mrs. Macauley to her son Ulysses in the movie <u>The Human Comedy</u> (a 1943 film that is one of my all-time sentimental favorites). "If it did, there would be no people; there would be no life at all." I know that what I take away from Christ Church that is good will always remain with me.

I can't say much more as I write this letter, because I do not wish to descend into clichés and pious platitudes – so I will close with one of the great old blessings that was used in our tradition in days gone by:

Go forth into the world in peace; Be of good courage; Hold fast that which is good; Render to no one evil for evil; Strengthen the fainthearted; Support the weak; Help the afflicted; Honor everyone; Love and serve the Lord, Rejoicing in the power of the Holy Spirit; And the blessing of God almighty, The Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, Be among you and remain with you always.

#### Roman Catholic Church to make record divestment from fossil fuels

More than 40 Roman Catholic institutions are to announce the largest ever faith-based divestment from fossil fuels, on the anniversary of the death of St Francis of Assisi.

The sum involved has not been disclosed, but the volume of divesting groups is four times higher than a previous church record (<u>https://cruxnow.com/global-church/2017/05/11/nine-catholic-institutions-divest-fossil-fuels-ahead-g7/</u>), and adds to a global divestment movement, led by investors worth \$5.5T.



#### **Reflections from the Current Senior Warden**

While I have been a member of Christ Church since 1986, I only became an active participant in 2002. The fact that I have rarely missed a Sunday since coming in January of 2003 is largely due to Fr. McDuffie. For the first time, not only did I listen to the sermon instead of planning the week ahead of me in my head, but I actually heard the sermon. Many were the times that some, or all, of the sermon reached out to me directly and touched a part of me that needed that particular message that day. I would wonder, and continue to, how he knows the messages I need to hear on a given day. Gradually, as I became more involved in the church and came to know Fr. John better, I came to appreciate many of his other gifts – his uncanny ability to remember names and faces, his rich grasp of theology, his boundless recall of arcane facts, his remarkable ability to imitate voices, his quirky sense of humor, his pastoral skill, to mention only a few.

In 2005, I became the Vestry secretary to a very contentious and highly uncongenial Vestry. Those meetings were frequently painful to sit through and to observe the lack of respect that abounded for everyone, but especially for Fr. John. I often wondered why he stayed, but stay he did, and gradually wrought significant changes not only in the Vestry but in the church in general. Today, Christ Church is a very different place than it was when I first became involved. We are a strong congregation with a beautiful music program and an enviable Youth Program. We have active ministries that involve many people and engage in tangible activities that benefit the congregation and the world outside the church. There are no longer turf wars among the ministries for money, attention, and yes, bulletin board space. Most of this is due to Fr. John. He has encouraged the formation of new ministries to address environmental stewardship and animal welfare. He has strengthened existing ministries like Pastoral Care and Outreach, often merely by his active participation.

I have served two stints as Senior Warden during the last 10 years of Fr. John's tenure. During this time, I have come to know John and Mary well. I count them both as good friends. John has earned his retirement. No one is sadder or more reluctant to see him go than I am. He actually brought me back to Christ, he nurtured my growth as a servant of Christ, he recognized what talents I might share with the church, he annoyed the daylights out of me at times, but always, he has been there as a steady pastoral presence to guide his flock.

#### **Reflections from a Current Vestry Member**

After a brief search early in 2007, my husband and I chose Christ Episcopal Church for its exceptional music. Nearly 11 years later, and after nearly five years on the Vestry, I am saddened by your decision to retire though I understand that only you, like all of us, can choose the time for that step. I have had many opportunities to reflect upon the demands placed upon the rector of an Episcopalian church. He or she must care for the parishioners of the church, keep the church strong, and make us a force for good in our community.

John, your conscientiousness in all of these areas is remarkable. You pour out a very personal level of caring when things go wrong for people. When I was hospitalized for a week with a serious case of pneumonia, you were there for me. When I received a diagnosis of cancer but didn't yet know the prognosis, you were there for me. As a vestry member, I have witnessed countless difficult management decisions you have had to make. Did I always agree with you? Of course not. But you consistently met two essential tests: you always, always tried to do the right thing; and before deciding, you truly listened to and considered the opinions offered. In terms of a presence in our community, two things that come through are the efforts you make for our church to contribute time as well as financial resources to various community ministries, and the amount of time you devote to developing and maintaining relationships with faith communities of all kinds. Finally, the resources required to keep an older church building functioning are enormous, and require constant attention. I have been tremendously impressed both by the efforts of our Junior and Senior Wardens, and by the number and importance of choices you must make. The level of coordination you must ensure and the degree of cooperation required are impressive. All of these qualities are difficult to find, and more difficult to find in a single individual. All that, and Jazz Vespers too! I will miss you, and can only hope we are lucky enough to find these qualities in your successor.

#### St. Francis' Flock Reflections on Father John McDuffie

St. Francis Flock expresses gratitude for the love and support of Father John McDuffie. We will miss him dearly.

We are so grateful that we had church leadership that supported (and continues to support through our own clergy liaison, Reverend Cindy Simpson) our animal welfare ministry. Father John played an instrumental role in not only the approval of the ministry's formation, but as an active participant in most, if not all, of our key events. We will always be grateful for the homilies he provided at our groundbreaking Pet Memorial Services, blessing our beloved animal companions at the Blessings of the Animals, and attending our first ever "Celebrate Animals Fair" which occurred on a highly unusual cold, windy, and



rainy day in May 2017. We had worked so hard to put the event together and our 14 animal welfare non-profits had faithfully shown up with their tents, tables, umbrellas, and animals. Attendance by the general public and parish was low, understandably, taking into account the undesirable weather.

While some of us manned booths, others were securing tents that had been blown over by the wind, and checking in with our non-profit guests to ensure they had what they needed, while conveying to them that their participation is greatly appreciated and that their work is valued and celebrated within our small, but passionate ministry, and within the greater Episcopal church.

picture of his beloved cat, Naim, and beloved dogs, Lulu, Rosie, and Winston McDuffie to be honored/remembered. I'll never forget as we were about to begin our very first Pet Memorial Service in 2015, we were naturally nervous, anticipating the unfolding of this unconventional event that we had created from scratch. Father John said softly with a smile, "Let's do this". And we did.



#### **Reflections from the Bargain Box**

John's ministry has blessed, supported and expanded the Outreach mission of The Bargain Box for one-third of its sixty-year history. Here are some highlights. In 2003, the development of Town Center meant the Bargain Box had to relocate or close its doors. John and the Vestry approved the relocation to our current home, under the leadership of Nellilewis Quay (and her broom!). In 2007, the store celebrated its 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary. John honored volunteers in a service and a reception in the Murdock Room. One of the hymns chosen was Hymn 541 – "Come Labor On....Servants, Well Done!" A brick was placed in the All Saints Walkway in recognition. Two years later, in June of 2009, the Bargain Box was renovated by several high school seniors as a community service project. New carpet, shelves, racks and paint brightened and modernized the sales floor and work areas. Prior to our grand reopening, John and Cindy toured the store and offered prayers and blessings for all volunteers with a liberal sprinkling of holy water.

Less than a year later, in the spring of 2010, the store front next to the Bargain Box became available for rent. John and the Vestry approved the expansion of the Bargain Box into this space, a HUGE leap of faith. The expansion project took several months, and in December, we were ready to celebrate the "new big store". John and Cindy led a volunteer parade with bells, candles and holy water throughout the store. For months, there were drip lines of holy water marking our front windows.

In May 2010, thanks to an idea by Jeanette Coppa, and with John's approval, the Bargain Box set up its first sales table in the dining room during coffee hour. Outreach Sunday expanded to Serving Others Sunday ("SOS") and we now need three tables. Each month, volunteers share information about the store and ways to volunteer, sell a few items and hold a themed raffle. Now the Bargain Box is sixty years old! In November, John and Cindy came to the store to celebrate, reminisce, and join in fellowship with volunteers and supporters. Prayers were offered and once again, holy water was sprinkled liberally in every nook and cranny, on every volunteer and granny!

In closing, I must mention that John has also been a faithful Bargain Box customer. Over the years, he has purchased many books and jazz CD's. However, I think he'd tell you that his most treasured find is a "glow in the dark" Jesus figurine! You can't get one of those just anywhere!

#### Reflections from the former Chaplain of CES and Associate Rector of Christ Church

John Stouffer McDuffie was received into this Diocese from the Diocese of Ohio in December of 1989. I met him almost right away at a WECA meeting and I still remember my first response: Thank you, God! He was personable, engaging, and came across as the genuine article – a priest eager to *nourish Christ's people from the riches of his grace, and strengthen them to glorify God in this life and in the life to come* (BCP p. 531). And I've been thanking God over all the years since. Here are some of the reasons.

In those early years, we were often at clergy meetings, conferences, Diocesan events, days away, and the like. We were in the same Region, he as Rector of St. Dunstan's, I as Rector of St. Anne's and both of us were active participants in WECA. So there were lots of opportunities to get a sense of who each other was. Sometimes we worked together. And as the years went on, I grew to value him as a treasured colleague who had a wise voice, a pastor's heart, a believer's faith, a counselor's savvy, and a servant's disposition. As I had intuited upon first meeting him, he was the real deal – a veritable disciple of Jesus Christ.

When I came to Christ Church, it was a time of turmoil and transition. The Rector left under a cloud within a couple months. An ensuing interim period followed with its own share of upheavals and challenges. As the time approached for seeking a new Rector, John and I had conversation. I hoped and I prayed that this authentic disciple might be called. And nineteen years ago he was!

Over our years of working as a team, new insights into his gifts emerged. His liturgical presence communicated The Presence in small services up in the choir, Great Feast Days of packed pews, in CES Thursday worship and the school's seasonal Eucharists, in pastoral offices, and bedside Communions under Special Circumstances. And his sermons? Some – like his homily at Taffy Berrien's funeral – I'll never forget! One more thing that has to be mentioned is what he does with that tenor sax. A stunning moment for me was my first hearing of his *Sometimes I feel like a Motherless Child* at a Good Friday Liturgy. Everything else fell away – it was Golgotha expressed in music.

Perhaps what stands out most, however, is that with all these gifts, John remained an unpretentious humble servant. He became a confidante in whom I could share deep concerns, personal sadness, even embarrassing confessional troubles. What a gift to be working with someone with whom vulnerability and honesty were experienced as sacred trusts. And there were occasions when he ventured similar confidences in me as well. I believe it is exceptional for a Rector and a Staff Associate to enjoy such collegial friendship.

I thank God for this man, and I thank John for more than these words can say.

John covers a wide waterfront encompassing poetry, prose, movies, art, politics, social science, travel, theology, sports (really, baseball) and, of course, jazz to name a few that come to mind. Also known to many is his uncanny recall of facts, places, events, and people. He resourcefully and creatively employs all these things in his practice of ministry. Having made the turn under his watch into ordained ministry, more than seminary or any other formational influence, among the many things he has offered me is the permission to draw from my own interests and experience in my preaching, teaching, and pastoral care.

On a more personal note, I have been greatly blessed by John's care as a deeply empathic and caring pastor. John doesn't run away when the winds kick up and the seas get stormy. He has a big heart for those who are sick, troubled or in need. In collaboration with Cindy Simpson, Kaye Kubas, and a host of faithful parishioners, he has nurtured a vibrant Pastoral Care ministry that by virtue of being deeply grounded in prayer and active expressions of compassion is second to none.
