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### **News From Our Senior Warden**

#### The Unstuck Church

I was privileged to attend the pre-Diocesan Convention session, The Unstuck Church, on January 25. The presenter, Tony Morgan, CEO of The Unstuck Group, helps churches asses their growth and health and take steps to become "unstuck." He talked about how at some point in its life cycle, every church becomes "stuck", and in order to become unstuck we need an interruption, because in times of interruption, we tend to turn to God.

A typical lifecycle for a church starts in new parishes with a Launch phase when the spirit is hopeful and the parish is very focused (usually on Sunday services) due to limited resources. As the parish grows, the Momentum Growth phase is characterized by entrepreneurial leadership and creativity. In this phase, churches tend to be open and welcoming. A Strategic Growth phase follows in which the church is very intentional about how it moves forward. Being mission-focused, the church values high-performing teams. At the peak of the lifecycle, a church is in the Sustained Health phase where the focus is on vision, ministry, replicating, and planting new churches. This phase is marked by collaboration. However, in a normal lifecycle, a church does not usually remain in the Sustained Health phase, but begins a downward trend, moving to the Maintenance phase. Here, the focus is on people already connected to the church rather than on new people. The way things are done is more important than why they are done. Traditions are protected and complexity reigns. The church is inwardly focused. If the church continues along this trajectory, the Preservation phase follows wherein a bureaucratic culture, the priority becomes keeping people from leaving the church. Finally, the church enters the Life Support phase where it is bleeding people and money, only a few key donors or an endowment keeps the doors open, and the church reverts to old methods that worked in the past but no longer do so. Does any of this sound like Christ Church? Certainly we fall somewhere along this continuum, and fortunately, I don't think it is at the far right. Like most churches, we have aspects that fall in multiple phases, some on the uptick, some sustained healthy, and others not so much.

A church that is stuck in any of these life cycle phases (even the good ones), needs an "interruption" to get them moving forward because "your church is perfectly designed to get the results you are currently getting." (Quote by Andy Stanley). Examples of such interruptions might be a significant decline in attendance, a financial crisis, no baptisms (indicating no young parishioners), or leader-induced. A new leader can be a perfect example of an interruption. But interruption means change. Morgan maintains that the pain of staying where we are (and the inevitable decline) is far greater than the pain we will go through during change. Having gone through some of that pain recently, I know this is hard to believe; but deliberate, thoughtful, and communal change is different than change for the sake of change. Also, while change is necessary to remain healthy, Morgan reminds us that we need to honor and celebrate the good work of the past, but also be prepared to move forward. He reminds us that a critical point for churches to remember going forward is that it is not only important to nurture the current parishioners' relationships with Christ, but if they wish to survive for the next 50 years, they need to reach the next generation to help them cultivate THEIR relationship to Christ.

The Diocese has engaged the Unstuck Group to assist with strategic planning for the Diocese and has invited the parishes in the Episcopal Diocese of Washington along as part of the process. The Bishop has asked church leadership to take The Unstuck Group's online parish assessment, found at http://assess.theunstuckchurch.com/. If you feel called to do so, please do take this assessment for individuals. Our new Rector and I will be working with the Vestry to do the same thing.

Let me just say in closing (and in my last Angelus article), that I believe Christ Church is in a good place with young families, vibrant missions, and a welcoming and caring congregation. But we are not perfect, and there are areas where I would say we are indeed "stuck." And fortunately, not only do we have a welcome interruption arriving March 1<sup>st</sup> in the form of The Rev. Lisa Zaina, but we have a Diocese that supports our efforts to improve.

### **Diocesan Convention**

### 2019 Diocesan Convention Reports

From Christie Carrico, Delegate Henry Mulzac, and Alternate Delegate Peggy Gilliam

#### Christie Carrico:

The 124th Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Washington was held Saturday, January 26th, 2019 at Washington National Cathedral. Entitled "Holy Interruption," it followed the previous evening's presentation by Tony Morgan of The Unstuck Group (vide supra). Christ Church was ably represented by Peggy Gilliam and Henry Mulzac, elected delegates, the Rev. Cindy Simpson, and myself, the Senior Warden.

The guest preacher was Nancy Beach of the Slingshot Group. She talked about building leadership teams that last. Successful teams are open, curious and willing to learn. Unsuccessful teams tend to be defensive, full of anger, and too interested in seeking approval. Attendees were asked to rate teams in their church with which they were familiar, either leadership teams or staff teams, on a scale of one to ten in 8 categories: humility, trust, men and women working together with mutual respect, commitment to speak candidly with love, love, joy, intensity, and self-awareness. Ms. Beach gave a brief description of each category to make it easier for people to decide where their particular leadership group fell.

The Rt. Rev. Mariann Edgar Budde, Bishop of Washington, outlined her vision for the strategic planning process that the Diocese is about to begin with the consulting and coaching assistance of The Unstuck Group. As a part of this process, parishes within the Diocese will have access to online parish assessment tools to provide a starting point to identify where individual congregations fall on a life cycle common to all churches. In addition, congregational leaders within the Diocese may take a 12-session online leadership course, Leading an Unstuck Church, free of charge. There is also the option of a year-long strategic planning process, customized to each parish and supported by the Unstuck Church Group and the Diocese.

The Very Rev. Randy Hollerith, Dean of Washington National Cathedral, also addressed the attendees. He pointed out that it costs \$20,000/day to operate the cathedral. They are very dependent on tourist visits to help pay these costs. Despite this, the governing board of the cathedral has made the decision that any member of any parish in the Episcopal Diocese of Washington can have free admission to the cathedral. Call ahead and your tickets will be waiting for you when you arrive.

Other business including approving the 2019 budget, electing clerical and lay members of the Standing Committee, and voting on the resolutions that Henry Mulzac and Peggy Gilliam address below.

### Henry Mulzac:

Having been a delegate or alternate for the past three years, I have noted an improved and streamlined process of the convention, particularly in the formation of the resolutions which required such forethought prior to the convention and the deadlines for their submission. Such considerations forestalled impromptu issues which created lengthy deliberations which most convention goers were ill-prepared to discuss on short notice and reduced the amount of resolutions we could address in such limited time.

Presiding Bishop Curry's planned attendance at the 2020 Convention was also widely hailed and anticipated.

#### Peggy Gilliam:

Three resolutions were proposed at this year's convention. Two were proposed as part of the regular process, and one was proposed during the convention.

Resolution #1 encourages church-related organizations within the Diocese to "recognize in their worship and prayer and by example, the biblical mandate to care for God's creation". The resolution asks for recognition throughout the year in liturgies and in prayer; consideration of adoption of a Season of Creation (September 1 through St. Francis of Assisi Day); and that Church organizations and members serve as an example in loving and preserving God's creation. This resolution was presented and passed with little comment or discussion.

Resolution #2 supports a 2018 resolution of the General Convention of the Episcopal Church to work toward a relationship of full communion between the Episcopal Church and the United Methodist church similar to that established with the Lutheran Church some years ago. The Diocese of Washington resolutions supports continued dialogue and study by congregations of the report, "A Gift to the World, Co-Laborers for the Healing of Brokenness" which was developed by the Episcopal Church-United Methodist Dialogue. This resolution prompted a series of very thoughtful comments from individuals, including several priests, who had experienced harm as a result of the Methodist Church's position on certain issues including the ordination of gay priests. Some believed that this effort toward unity should not be pursued because of these hurtful attitudes and policies; others believed that was an excellent reason for having such conversations. In the end, the resolution passed based on the premise that attitudes cannot be changed without thoughtful discussion, and that the process undertaken by the Episcopal Church would, if supported on the level of congregations and individuals, lead to such discussions on a variety of topics.

Resolution #3 on "responsible governance and politics" spoke to the just-ended partial shutdown of the Federal Government. It asked Congress and the Administration to pay furloughed employees the wages they are due as quickly as possible, and to resolve publicly never again to shut down the Federal Government for non-related political purposes. The resolution passed with some comment and with very minor amendment and is to be forwarded to the Office of the President, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the Senate Majority Leader.

# Reflections on the Adult Forum Topic: On Christian Animal Ethics with Prof. David Clough

But not a single sparrow can fall to the ground without your Father knowing it. Matt. 10:29.



Our sponsored Adult Forum with Professor David Clough had promised to be a thought-provoking discussion about what our Christian faith asks of us with regard to how we treat animals (particularly farmed animals) and it delivered!

Attendance was high, and the crowd was engaged. In addition to our own parishioners, we were joined by members from the St. Francis Guild, another church animal welfare ministry, as well as some members of the general community.

### Professor Clough argued:

"The challenge of Christian animal ethics is that we are confronted with an abyss. There is an abyss between the kind of treatment that seems obviously demanded of Christians in relation to the kinds of things that we believe about animals as fellow creatures and the kind of treatment we currently mete out to fellow animal creatures, especially in so far as we are



using them for food. This abyss is huge and scandalous.

Christians have very strong, faith-based reasons for being seriously concerned about the well-being of fellow animal creatures but have been asleep at the wheel in relation to engaging the implications of that faith based understanding for our practice [as Christians]."



He further argued that addressing the welfare of farmed animals (as well as the welfare of wildlife) helps the animals, the environment, and, ultimately, us. What can we do to start to build a bridge across this abyss and practice what is demanded of us as Christians with regard to our fellow animal creatures? First, reduce consumption of animals. Second, improve the source of the animal products that are consumed.

### March 10th & 24th - Visit with our new Rector, The Rev. Lisa Zaina!



# March 31<sup>st</sup> – "Reclaiming Jesus, part 2: The Boston Declaration" with The Rev. Pete Bastien
