Dear Friends in Christ,

As this issue of the Angelus comes to you, it is about the time of our Parish Annual Meeting, and part of what I have to report in this letter is also in my Annual Report to the Parish. I want especially to thank Janice Musselman, our outgoing Junior Warden, who has done an extraordinary amount of work in managing the property needs of our church over the last two years, as well as supervising an energy audit undertaken with Standard Energy Solutions, which is poised to help us save a lot of money spent on utilities bills as we move into the future. God bless you, Janice! I also want to thank Tristan Poje and Mark Wright, as they depart from our Vestry with three solid years of service, as we welcome new incoming members of the Vestry at our annual Meeting.

By now you may well have heard about focus groups that have been convened for us to share a new vision for our facilities at Christ Church and Christ Episcopal School, as we move into the future. And you may well have attended one of the focus groups. For the past three years our executive Church leadership has spent a considerable amount of time and energy in an ongoing dialogue with Christ Episcopal School leadership, including Head of School Caroline Chapin and Paul Mammalian, Chair of the Board of Governors of CES. The gist of these conversations was that our School had reached its high-water mark in enrollment some four years after the Church purchased the Jefferson Building in 2004, and then converted space in it in order to house the Upper School classes and administrative offices, as well as art and music rooms, and the School Library. Student enrollment began declining after 2008, and is now at a steady state and predicted to remain at about the same level (150-160 students) as it was before the expansion project began 13 years ago. It was determined that the continued good health of CES and the Church would be collectively enhanced if the Jefferson Building could be sold, and alternative provisions made for housing students and School administrative personnel who would move out of the building.

I can attest that many, many meetings went on between a small group of School and Church leaders on what the best strategic planning scenario might be. Our Vestry was kept closely apprised of developments, and the full CES School Board was finally made fully aware of these conversations in October, 2016.

What has emerged is the vision that we have collectively been sharing with as many of you as possible in a series of Focus Groups and private conversations from late March through April. In brief, we would like to sell the Jefferson Building; move the Upper School (grades 5-8) and art and music rooms into the Church Building, with redesigned and renovated classrooms; build a new 12,000 sq. foot building on the Linda Foley Park property, which would house the Lower School (grades K-4), library, and administrative offices; and consider several other improvements to the

Church Building, including the construction of an elevator, new flooring in the nave of the church, repainting our worship space, and opening up the narthex and closet space in the back of the church to be more welcoming. We plan to share the vision once again during our Annual Meeting proceedings during the morning, and gather more feedback and questions from you all. I'm excited and hopeful about these emergent new ways to be here together as Church and School as we continue forward.

Finally, I need to comment on our operating budget for 2017. You can see from the Stewardship Committee Report in your packet that we are excited about new financial pledging units in the church, as we continue to welcome new individuals and families into our community. This might have been a banner pledge campaign this year ("Living by Faith") were it not for the fact that we had many traditionally reliable pledge units that had to adjust their giving due to personal life circumstances. We also lost some generous pledgers who either entered into eternal life, or who moved away or transferred from the parish. The result is that we fell some \$25,000 short of our campaign goal.

With an increase in fixed expenses (maintenance, supplies, employee benefits, and a modest increase in staff compensation), your Vestry was forced to make cuts to programmatic ministries as well as our commitment to the Diocese of Washington. This is never comfortable or easy work. We decreased our pledge to the Diocese by \$10,200. We decreased our Outreach (Social Ministries) budget by \$1,000. The Jazz Vespers budget was decreased by \$1500. Christian Education and Youth Ministry was decreased by \$4,000.

Finally, the largest budget cut was made to the music program, for \$17,000. Since 2000, Christ Church's Adult Choir has been augmented by the presence of professional singers, who have provided leadership and support to each of the four vocal sections of the choir; and, more recently, paid high school choral scholars. This allocation of resources has allowed us to have one of the best adult choirs in the Diocese of Washington, continuing a rich musical tradition that has been a part of Christ Church's identity for many decades. With regret, the Vestry has made the decision that after the 2016-17 music program year ends on June, we will no longer be able to support these singers and choral scholars in our budget. This decision was based on having to consider which programmatic budgets could be adjusted in order to provide the greatest good to the greatest number of people, and keep us poised to be a healthy church.

What this means is that the music program will be going through a transition and adjustment period. We are blessed to have many fine volunteer singers in our parish, and a gifted choral conductor in Tad Cavuoti. We now need to recruit some new volunteer voices, and particularly at this time in the alto and bass sections of the choir. If you are interested in singing, we want to hear from you! We may also need to make changes to the choral repertoire of the choir.

I do remain confident that we can maintain a good all-volunteer choir as we move forward. Even as I say that, we will bid a sad, but fond farewell to Charlie Meininger, Amanda Cornaglia, Keely Borland, Vince Patterson, and Rishabh Bajekal in June, thanking them for their ministry.

As we continue through the month of May, I pray for God's blessings on all of us. As Christ met Mary Magdalene in the garden on the morning of his resurrection, so may he meet us each and every day, and especially as we continue in the great 50 days of Easter.

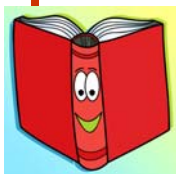

Inside Outreach

An Update on the Christ Church Outreach Program



“The generous will themselves be blessed for they share their food with the poor.”

– Proverbs 22:9

Christ Episcopal Church seeks to help the poor through many outreach partners, including Interfaith Works. Part of their mission includes the Interfaith Works Women's Center, formerly known as the Wilkins Avenue Women's Assessment Center or Sophia House.

The Women's Center, located here in Rockville (<http://www.iworksmc.org/iw-womens-center/>) is a 70-bed emergency shelter serving approximately 300 women per year with housing as well as vocational, medical, and behavioral health services. The new facility on Taft Court off Gude Drive provides a better space for delivering these services than the previous smaller facility on Wilkins Ave.

Every day that is the fifth Sunday of a given month (as April 30th was this year), a group of Christ Church members, youth, and friends go to the church to prepare meals and then deliver them to the Women's Center to feed the women at the shelter. In January, despite the season, we held a barbeque for the women and actually received a round of applause when we delivered the food. Our time and efforts are truly appreciated.

The next time we feed the women at the shelter is on July 30th. If you are interested in learning more or want to volunteer, please contact Michele Craig at mcraig@cecrockville.org.

The “Common” Pelican

The Great Seal of the State of Louisiana, and one of the stained-glass tabernacles here at Christ’s Church have something in common. Both the seal of the State of Louisiana and the upper right portion of Christ Church’s “Ascension” stained window depicts a symbolic motif that is the embodiment of self-sacrifice.



The pelican is an important bird in symbolic Christian tradition. The official state seal of Louisiana was adopted in 1902. It features a pelican tending its three young chicks in their nest. The actions of the pelican give the appearance that the pelican is actually tearing some of its own feathers and flesh to feed the chicks, which apparently, a pelican will do rather than allow its young to starve. Ornithologist will cite the bird’s natural history in that the adult pelicans dip their beaks into their pouches to extract fish with which to feed their young led to the

misperception that the parents were ripping open their breast to offer their body and blood to their young.

The most noticeable difference between the two depictions is the position of the bird’s head and unlike the position of the American Bald Eagle’s head on the Presidential seal (which denotes War or Peace) there is no associated significance. The Louisiana seal has changed over the years, and at one point there were a dozen chicks in the nest. But since pelicans normally do not have large numbers of chicks at one time, the present version is more realistic. It also makes people feel a bit better knowing that the pelican does not have to pull itself apart for more than three of the young. The Louisiana motto "Union, Justice, Confidence" surrounds the birds on the present seal. Interestingly enough, Louisiana is one of the only states in the entire United States not divided up into counties, but rather Parishes.



Vegetable Garden Basics

This is the time of year when nature is in full bloom. Time to start a vegetable garden! Right now you can grow peas, lettuce, and many other different kinds of leafy greens. In a week or two, we can start planting tomatoes, peppers, eggplant, okra, and other summer favorites.

What are some benefits of growing a Vegetable Garden?

1. **Convenience.** Vegetable gardens can be grown anywhere that has well-drained soil, sun, and preferably a barrier from pests such as deer. Even tomato plants can be grown in containers. 2. **Superior Freshness, flavor, and nutrition.** Nothing beats the taste of fresh vegetables grown in your yard. These veggies are at the peak of their taste and nutritional value. If you grow your own vegetables, you'll be more likely to eat them. Vegetables are high in vitamins and minerals and reduce the likelihood of many health problems.
 3. **Reduces Carbon Footprint.** Produce typically travels 1500 miles before it is consumed. <http://theecoguide.org/whats-environmental-impact-growing-your-own-food>. If you grow vegetables, you cut out all of the transportation and resulting carbon emissions ordinarily required to get vegetables to your door.
 4. **Reduces Pesticide Exposure.** When you grow your own produce, you know exactly what is needed to grow it. Since you will be examining your plants on a regular basis, you will be able to stop problems in an organic way before they get too serious.
 5. **Exercise.** Gardening incorporates many exercise principles, such as stretching, lunging, repetition, squatting, and resistance. Gardening can burn up to 200 calories per hour. Wouldn't it be nicer to do your exercise outside in the sunshine?
 6. **Make Friends.** Growing a garden results in many extra veggies that you can give to family and friends. You'll become a very popular person very quickly!

Symbolism of the Lamb



Symbolism has always been put to use in the design of stained glass or iconographic windows. Animals, plants, and even inanimate objects are often times used to convey messages.



The Lamb of the Resurrection (agnus dei) is one such symbol and is present on the left tabernacle of Christ's Church stained glass window. Notice the lamb supporting a white pennant bearing a red Cross which symbolizes the risen Christ. Also notice, the red cross on a white field which is also identified as being the Cross of Saint George, the Patron Saint of England. The lamb is typically crowned or haloed and sometimes gazing at the cross on the pennant! Agnus Dei, the figure of a lamb bearing a cross, is symbolical of the Savior as the "Lamb of God". The device is common in ecclesiastical art, but the name is especially given in the Church of Rome to a small cake made of the wax of the Easter candles and impressed with this figure. Since the 9th century, it has been customary for the popes to bless these cakes and distribute them on the Sunday after Easter among the faithful, by whom they are highly prized as having the power to avert evil. In modern times, the distribution has been limited to persons of distinction and is made by the Pope on his accession and every seven years thereafter.

Nothing was exempt from consideration - clothes, jewelry, books, CDs, housewares. It got to be kind of fun to tackle a new closet or cupboard or drawer to see what I could unload. The third 10 bags got to be a little harder, mainly because they involved some effort - going through files to get rid of old utility bills and the like or hauling 30 years of house paint up from the basement.
