From the Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

I love summer! As an active parish priest, I look forward to a season in which I can have some times to let my mind "lay by its store of troubles", as the poet Wallace Stevens wrote in "Credences of Summer", one of my favorite poems. It is good to lower one's activity level and do some recreational fun things, like travel, go swimming, lie in the sun, go to a ball game, etc. A few years ago I was attending a conference in which a hard-working clergy person said, in effect, "God never relaxes, and so we in the Church shouldn't relax either." I felt very guilty, until I remembered the good advice the Rev. George Ross, with whom I served years ago, gave to me. "Summer is the time in the church in which we lie fallow", he said. Thank you, George!

Of course this does not mean that I want you to stop attending church on Sunday. Please come as often as you can – especially because in this year, we will hear so many good gospel passages from Luke. We'll be following Jesus and his disciples on the road to Jerusalem.

Also, from mid-June through July, I will be leading a book study group in the Parish House on Sunday mornings at 9:00 a.m. We're going to be reading and discussing a book entitled Why Christian?, written by Douglas John Hall, a Canadian theologian. Hall has done as good a job as anybody I've read in accurately portraying the contemporary cultural landscape we find ourselves in here in North America – a landscape that has changed greatly over the last 50 to 60 years. This book is series of reflections based on an imaginary dialogue that a theology professor is having with one of his college students, who is on what Hall calls "the edge of faith". As we read these reflections, we're invited to ask ourselves the questions of what we ourselves believe in, and why we do.

If you're interested in joining this conversation, do let me know. You can purchase the book from me for \$21.00.

Let me close by sharing with you a poem that has become near and dear to my heart. As I write this letter, it is the day after the Feast of Pentecost, the day in which we commemorate the gift of the Holy Spirit given to the disciples in Jerusalem long ago. In England the day is traditionally known as "Whitsunday" which is either a contraction of "White Sunday", or a use of the old English word "wytte" – i.e., on this Day the "wit and wisdom of the Holy Spirit was given to the disciples." In her Pentecost sermon, Cindy Simpson passionately and convincingly reminded us all that this gift was not just a one-time bestowal to a chosen few – rather, it is a gift that can come to any of us, at any time, at God's initiative. As I listened to Cindy speak, I was taken back to a service at the National Cathedral last year,

when I was presenting some of our parishioners for confirmation and reception into the Anglican Communion of faith. While people were being confirmed, the Cathedral Choir sang a beautiful anthem called "Listen, Sweet Dove" written by Grayston Ives. The text of the anthem is based on a poem by the 17th-century English priest George Herbert. (I'm hoping that our parish choir can add this anthem to its repertory). Here is the poem, in its entirety, entitled "Whitsunday":

Listen sweet Dove unto my song
And spread thy golden wings in me
Hatching my tender heart so long,
Till it get wing, and fly away with thee.
Where is the fire that once descended
On thy Apostles? Thou didst then
Keep open house, richly attended,
Feasting all comers by twelve chosen men.

Such glorious gifts thou didst bestow, That th'earth did like a heaven appear; The stars were coming down to know If they might mend their wages, and serve here.

The sun which once did shine alone Hung down his head, and wisht for night, When he beheld twelve suns for one Going about the world and giving light

But since those pipes of gold, which brought That cordial water to our ground Were cut and martyr'd by the fault Of those, who did themselves through their side wound,

Thou shutt'st the door, and keep'st within; Scarce a good joy creeps through the chink; And if the braves of conqu'ring sin Did not excite thee, we should wholly sink.

Lord, though we change, thou art the same; The same sweet God of love and light; Restore this day, for thy great name, Unto his ancient and miraculous right.

In this poem, Herbert seems to be lamenting that the day of Pentecost, so bright and powerful so long ago, now seems dimmed; and he ends with the longing that the power of that ancient day be restored.

All I can say is this – on Sunday, May 19th at Christ Church, Rockville, as Cindy preached; as our choirs sang; as we prayed together; as Patrick Slater, Bridget Slater, and Anna Cooper were baptized; as we beheld a gorgeous array of flowers behind our altar; as we welcomed new individuals and families into our midst at a reception downstairs – I felt the power of the Holy Spirit in our midst. We have been, are, and are still becoming, a blessed community.

Have a wonderful and blessed summer. And don't be stranger - come hang out with us!

An update from the Christ Church Outreach Committee

LOAVES AND FISHES

Have you ever wondered why a group of people dressed in jeans and old shirts gather at 10:15 a.m. every third Sunday in the Dining Room? They are the Christ Church volunteers for the Loaves and Fishes program at St. Stephen and the Incarnation in DC. Our volunteers join with other groups to serve hot lunch to over 300 people on a typical Sunday.

Loaves and Fishes has served the hungry and homeless on Saturday, Sundays, and on Federal holidays since 1968. Since most Washington food programs serve only on weekdays, Loaves and Fishes offers a crucial service to enable people to eat a healthy meal on the weekend.

Loaves and Fishes does more than serve meals, however. Last October, volunteers conducted a successful voter registration drive, a poignant reminder that being homeless does not mean you give up your rights to citizenship. Loaves and Fishes also works with other social service organizations, such as Samaritan Ministries, to educate their meal guests about programs that could help them escape homelessness and rebuild their lives.

Music at Christ Church

MASS OF THE MONTH ON JUNE 2ND

On Sunday, June 2nd at the 10:00 a.m. Eucharist, the Choristers and Choir will sing Joseph Haydn's Missa brevis St. Joannis de Deo, accompanied by string trio.

Most likely written in 1775 for the monastery of the Brothers of Mercy in Eisenstadt, it quickly earned the nickname "Little Organ Mass" because of the extended duet between organ and soprano soloist during the Benedictus. In the past decade, it has become a favorite at Christ Church to celebrate the end of the Easter and Choir season.

On June 2nd, we celebrate the Second Sunday after Pentecost and also *Corpus Christi* – The Body of Christ. In addition to a favorite Gregorian Chant setting of Psalm 96 with bells and congregational refrain, many favorite hymns that day will include "Glorious things of thee are spoken", "Come, my Way, my Truth, my Life", and "God be with you 'till we meet again". Anthems and Motets will include "Love bade me welcome" from Ralph Vaughan Williams' <u>Five Mystical Songs</u>, and Mozart's lovely "Ave verum corpus".

We are blessed in being able to offer polyphonic Mass settings as part of the monthly musical cycle at Christ Church. We hope you are able to join us for these wonderful occasions.

SUMMER CHOIR BEGINS JUNE 9TH

Singers of all ages are invited to help lead the music during June, July, and August. Join us for one Sunday or as many as you can. We rehearse in the Choir Room at 9:15 a.m. directly before the service to prepare a simple anthem, metrical psalm, and service music. While a number of regular Choir members and Choristers sing through the summer, the relaxed schedule allows additional members of the congregation and visitors to sing for specific Sundays.

DENVER CONFERENCE FOR ANGLICAN MUSICIANS

Our music director Tad Cavuoti will be attending the annual conference of the Association of Anglican Musicians in Colorado during the first week of July. Each day, 250 Episcopal organists and choir directors visit at least two churches for worship, recitals, and professional concerns. Venues will include the Cathedral of St. John, St. Andrew's, and St. Paul's in Denver, and the Air Force Academy Chapel and Grace & St. Stephen's Church in Colorado Springs. Workshop sessions include a panel discussion on "Music, Liturgy, and Church Growth in the 21st Century", "Engaging Technology for Church Musicians", and "Bringing your Choir to England.

This is always an invigorating and educational experience – a chance to renew and enlarge upon musical and liturgical friendships – and a chance to pick the brains of the very best Episcopal musicians in the country. In the summer of 2014, the national AAM Conference will take place in Washington DC, where Tad has been an integral part of the planning committee.

Assistant Rector Mini-Sabbatical

After completion of six years' of wonderful ministry at Christ Church, I am taking a mini-sabbatical this coming summer, as is common tradition for Episcopal clergy and supported by our Rector and Vestry. This period provides rest, refreshment, and renewal of body, mind, and spirit. I am grateful to our parish leadership for blessing this time of renewal and look forward to it. I will be away June 10th through August 17th. I thank everyone in our parish for six years of growth, joy, and abundant life I find in our communal life, thanks to your faithfulness and the abiding foundational breath of the Spirit.

Jazz Vespers Benefitting the Bishop Walker School for Boys

On May 5th, Christ Church was filled with the beautiful and soulful sounds of the piano, bass, drums, and saxophone to celebrate the Jazz Vespers service benefitting the Bishop Walker School for Boys (BWS). The addition of a dynamic singer added to the spirit that filled the church... Joy, Harmony, and Song... It was amazing! Over 110 people attended the event, and the guests included many board members from BWS as well as Bishop Marianne Budde!

Bishop Walker School is a school east of the Anacostia River for boys who live below the poverty line. The late Bishop of Washington DC's vision for this school was to give the boys a quality education and spiritual background so that the cycle of poverty may be broken and they could, in turn, grow to be stewards of the community. This Jazz Vespers event raised over \$2100 for the school to help them purchase breakfast for a year, uniforms for the boys, as well as supplement mental health programs.

Under the direction of Michele Craig, the Youth Group hosted a lively Cinco de Mayo reception for the guests, complete with fabulous Mexican food! It was a festive occasion, and the support and preparation from the youth group was appreciated!
