From the Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

As I write this note to you, it is a beautiful September afternoon, and the official beginning of fall is almost here. I am excited and energized by the beginning of the Christ Church programmatic year. It is a joy to see all of you when I return from summer holiday, and I am especially delighted to see several new families with babies and young children. On Sunday mornings, we have quite a number of little ones in our nursery, which is one of the most beautiful spaces in all of the churches in our Diocese. I am also delighted when new individuals and families tell me that they have found a warm reception at Christ Church, and a special, almost ineffable feeling of God's grace and goodness. If you are among those extending a friendly greeting to the newly arrived, way to go!

As October comes, we will go into an annual time of prayerful discernment and activity in our fall financial stewardship campaign. This year's campaign is called "Living by Faith". We are invited to give thanks to almighty God for the many blessings in our lives, and part of giving thanks, and living faithfully, is realized by making an annual pledge of financial support to Christ Church. If you find that there is something good, and holy, and inspiring, and life-giving about our parish and its ministry, we hope that you will want to join with others in helping to sustain this ministry. ADULT COVENANT CLASS BEGINS



Fr. McDuffie will once again lead a fall Adult Covenant Class, beginning on **Wednesday**, **October 2nd, at 7:30 p.m.**, and continuing for six more classes on successive Wednesdays through November 13. This is a short course on Christian faith as it is lived in the Episcopal Church, and it is designed for adults who are new to Christ Church or the Episcopal Church. It can also serve as a "refresher course" for those who have been in the church for some time. Participants have the option to be presented for adult baptism at Christ Church; or confirmation, reception, or public reaffirmation of their baptismal vows at a special service on Saturday, November 16th, at the Washington National Cathedral.

UPDATE ON OUR KOREAN CONGREGATION

Since its beginnings in February 2012, our Korean Episcopal Congregation has shown gradual growth and generous support from a small but dedicated community of worshippers. Attendance at the 1:00 p.m. Sunday service has ranged between 15 and 20 in recent weeks, and Fr. Athanasius Choi is to be commended for his faithful mission focus and ministry outreach.

Earlier this year, Fr. Choi asked if Christ Church could sponsor him for permanent residence, which means our guaranteeing his gainful employment and assisting in revising the visa status for himself and his family. Our parish leadership thought it would be more appropriate to approach the Diocese of Washington with this request, and I am happy to report that Bishop Budde subsequently contacted the Rt. Rev. Paul Kim, Archbishop of the Korean Episcopal Church (you may recall that Archbishop Kim visited us here at Christ Church in July of last year). The Archbishop has guaranteed acceptable financial support for Fr. Choi over the next three years, such that the Diocese of Washington is now in agreement to sponsor the Chois. This is good news for all, and we are happy to continue to be the "nesting place" for this congregation. Our weekly parish prayers have been fruitful!

Fr. Choi tells me that there are congregants of his church who may be seeking baptism and confirmation in the near and further future in the fellowship of our own Christ Church community, and we stand by ready to assist in these ministries.

JAZZ VESPERS RETURNS, SUNDAY, OCTOBER 6

Why not come and celebrate the rich and vibrant world of blues and jazz at our first fall Jazz Vespers service, on Sunday, October 6th, at 5:00 p.m.? Fr. PARKING LOT IDENTIFICATION IS NEEDED

Recent conversations with Christ Episcopal School have revealed that increasing numbers of people are attempting to use our parking lot during the work week in order to attend to District Court business. The parking lot and the driveway parking spaces along the side of the church are only for the use of people involved with Church or School activities, or people who have business in the Jefferson Building.

If you are coming to Christ Church for a meeting, or worship, or ministry activity during the week from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., we would ask that you display a laminated parking identification card on your dashboard inside your car. These cards are available in our parish office, and if you are a regular visitor, you can have one for permanent use. This practice will greatly help us to know who is authorized to be in our lot, as we have a towing policy for unauthorized individuals.

Please remember that no one is permitted to park along the church driveway between the hours of 2:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m., because we need to keep two lanes open for School dismissal and pickup in the afternoon.

Thank you for helping to make our parking lot be better available to those who need to use it for church or school.

STOP HUNGER NOW

It is a blessing when we have an opportunity to live our faith such that the fruit of our labor directly alleviates human suffering in the world, in our own time. Over the past four years, our faith community has fed more than 125,000 children worldwide through the annual CEC Stop Hunger Now event. Please mark your calendars for Saturday, November $2^{\rm nd}$, 2013, when we again show the spirit of Christ Church as a living extension of Jesus' mission.

Stop Hunger Now is a U.S. based non-profit hunger relief organization that facilitates the distribution of nutritious and stable meals for children in schools and orphanages throughout the developing world. In a single day, a volunteer community can assemble thousands of meal packets that are delivered to places of need worldwide. Christ Church has been a leader among Maryland churches in support of this effort, with participants of all ages and generations making the event a highlight of our Outreach Ministry.

A key to the success of Stop Hunger Now Saturday is that it is organized as an efficient and family-friendly enterprise, with roles for every age and ability. Children and teens work alongside their parents, grandparents, and peers in a cooperative and raucous setting, where the work of our hands connects us all with our sisters and brothers all over our planet. And it's great fun!

NEWS FROM COMMUNITY MINISTRIES OF ROCKVILLE

Community Ministries of Rockville (CMR) is a faith-based organization that seeks to improve the quality of life of the most vulnerable residents in Montgomery County through the Mansfield Kaseman Health Clinic; the Rockville Emergency Assistance Program (REAP); the Language Outreach Program (LOP); the Elderly Ministries Program; and Jefferson House. Through the Outreach Committee, Christ Church provides monthly funding to CMR to support these direct service programs.

Program updates

The **Kaseman Health Clinic** continues to grow and is **now open five days a week**, Monday through Friday. The clinic serves uninsured adults in Montgomery County and currently provides primary medical care, as well as specialty services in the areas of orthopedics, endocrinology, podiatry, and dermatology.

The **Language Outreach Program (LOP)** has registered 230 adults and children for the fall semester of ESOL and literacy classes, which began on September 10th. Volunteer tutors for students' school-aged children are needed on Tuesday and Thursday nights.

Music at Christ Church

MUSICIANS' RETREAT AT CLAGGETT

For the past dozen years, I have been able to attend the annual two-day musicians' retreat at the Claggett Conference Center near Buckeystown MD. Organized by the Diocese of Maryland, this event draws about 50 participants from the Baltimore and Washington metropolitan areas, as well as others from Pennsylvania, Virginia, and North Carolina. Last year, I had the honor of presenting a session "Singing the Psalms: a practical guide". It was based on our worship experience at Christ Church with medieval plainsong, Anglican chant, and rhymed metrical paraphrases, and was very well received. This year, the opening worship was the service of Evensong in which the singing of Psalms plays a major part. I was invited to rehearse and conduct Psalm 46 using unaccompanied plainsong and Psalm 87 using Anglican chant accompanied by the organ. It was interesting to discover how much of the previous year's presentation had remained in the collective memory and experience of the participants. At Evensong, the words became clearer, and praying the psalms through singing made the entire experience more profound and intense.

One very interesting session at the conference involved a review of "new hymns" included in the 1982 Hymnal. I am happy to report that the Congregation and Choirs of Christ Church rate very high in the use of both the number and variety of hymns reviewed in this session. I believe that in Rockville, we truly delight in offering God our musical praise in the most imaginative and long-lasting combinations of words and music.

WELCOME TO NEW CHORISTERS



We are delighted to welcome four new Choristers to the group of boys and girls which helps lead the singing each Sunday at the 9:00 a.m. service, and joins with the adults and teens of the Choir for the beginning of the 11:00 a.m. service on the first Sundays of the month.

On Sunday, October 27th, Dylan Marshall, Marie Matulka-Nicely, Esme Pickel, and Eliana Wong will receive their white surplices to wear over their red cassocks. This is symbolic of the six weeks of preparations they will have made in rehearsals, learning such basics as singing posture, finding their place in the hymnal, and processing down the center aisle. They will have also memorized the Choristers' Prayer:

Bless, O Lord, us thy servants who minister in thy temple; grant that what we sing with our lips we may believe in our hearts, and what we believe in our hearts we may show forth in our lives; through Jesus Christ our Lord. AMEN.

Choristers rehearse each Thursday from 4:30-5:30 p.m. in the Choir Room, with snacks in the Dining Room beforehand at 4:15 p.m. We welcome new Choristers throughout the season. MASS OF THE MONTH FROM SAN MARCO, VENICE

We are blessed in being able to offer choral Mass settings as part of the monthly musical cycle at Christ Church. On Sunday, October 6th at the 11:00 a.m. Eucharist, the Choristers and Choir will sing the Mass in A Major by Antonio Lotti (1667-1741). Despite his Italian name, Lotti was probably born in Hanover where his father was Kapellmeister, and he also had connections in Dresden. By age 16, he had moved to Venice, and by age 20, he had become part of the musical establishment at the basilica of San Marco, where he remained for the rest of his life. He rose eventually to become chief Organist and Choirmaster. His Mass in A Major is a delightfully bright and cheerful composition, full of imitative counterpoint among the various Soprano, Alto, Tenor, and Bass vocal parts. Although optional horn parts exist, in the edition our music director Tad Cavuoti has created, it is more appropriately performed with light organ accompaniment or *a cappella*.

To complement this Italian/German baroque music, our Choirs and Congregation will join in singing Psalm 37 to a chant by the present day Italian/German/American Tad Cavuoti. The text of that Psalm begins "Do not fret yourself because of the ungodly". In a composer's pun, the harmony of the chant is based upon on the "open strings" of the guitar, quite literally the chord produced when the frets are not used.

[All lay hands on the shawl as the touch of God's blessing, then pray silently or aloud for (name). The liturgy then continues:]

A sacred covering of security and well-being,

Sustenance and comfort in good times and difficulties.

May s/he be

Blessed with healing,

Cradled in hope,

Kept in joy,

Graced with peace,

And enfolded in love.

Blessed be! Amen.






