From the Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

Years ago, I went to a conference sponsored by the Episcopal Network for Stewardship, and one of the speakers invited us to consider what we each gave to support the life of our respective faith communities. We were encouraged to think of our individual financial resources, and then to reflect on the status of our habits of giving on a continuum. To what extent could we consider ourselves to be in the habit of sacrificial giving – that is, giving with the knowledge that we were feeling a pinch with some of the creature comforts to which we were ordinarily accustomed? And to what extent might we be merely "tippers" – that is, keeping most of the fruits of our labors for ourselves, and merely giving the church a "gratuity" as an afterthought?

I have to admit that these were uncomfortable questions for me – and I can only suspect that they might be for all of us. I had already dealt with some of those questions when I was just out of seminary and joined the Stewardship Commission of the Diocese of Ohio. At the first meeting I attended, I was told by the chair of that group, "You must be tithing as a personal witness, if you are going to be in our group." A woman at the meeting who was a hairdresser in Cleveland proceeded to look at me, and smile, and then said proudly, "Every two weeks I get a paycheck from my job; then I deposit it and immediately write a check for 10% of my paycheck to my church."

In a word, I felt intimidated and pushed into a corner! I made my way home and told my wife that to stay in this group, I had to pledge to tithe to our church. We prayed about it, and we decided that we would take on this discipline, and it took a while for me to actually feel good about what we were doing. No one likes to feel forced or pressured to give – but gradually I felt thankful that I had made the commitment because it was gratifying and life-giving.

Years later, I can tell you that I'm no longer tithing – paradoxically, it becomes <u>harder</u> to do when you have more income, and an increasing array of responsibilities toward family and the needs of children. But those questions are still with me every time I consider what I'm going to pledge as a gift to the church. Is my gift a form of "paying dues"? Is it a gratuity? Is it something done under compulsion? Or is it given with a sense of joy and thanksgiving, and in a spirit of sacrifice? Again, I'm reminded that the word "sacrifice" does not simply mean choosing to undergo suffering – it literally means "to make holy". Am I pledging a gift that is a sacred offering to the glory of God?

I invite you to consider these questions as you pray about what offering you want to make in thanksgiving to God. There is no spirit of compulsion or guilt inducement – just a simple invitation to think about yourself and your life with God, and what you can offer. For me, I have a recurrent experience of gratitude, when I think about our church family as an oasis in a confusing world of secularism. At our best, we have something to share about giving and receiving Christ's love,

amongst ourselves and to the world around us – and that makes a big difference to me, in terms of who I am and how I see things, and how I want to help strengthen our life.

As October begins, we continue in our capital campaign, "Firm Foundation, Bright Future", and we also begin our fall stewardship campaign, "A New Heart and a New Spirit". One is for the long-term future stability and strength of our church and school communities; the other is for the support of our annual budget that funds all that we do as a church. With joy, I am pledging to both campaigns – and I pray that you might be moved to do so as well.

I'd like to share one more story about giving that has inspired me for years. In the middle of July, our parishioner John Weddell entered into eternal life. John had been a member of Christ Church since 1962, and we gathered on August 26 not only to remember his earthly life, but also to celebrate his entrance into resurrection life in Christ. John was a warm, caring and positive person who loved people – most of all his family. His life was in many ways an embodiment of joy.

But John also loved Christ Church. At his funeral, I invited people to gaze at our Ascension Window, over the altar. About nine years ago, John suddenly called me up and said, "I've just come into a windfall – it is \$40,000, and I would like to give it to Christ Church." It just so happened that at the same time we were preparing to pack up our Ascension Window and ship it to Winona, Minnesota, for badly-needed repairs. The total cost of the repairs was exactly \$40,000, and I said to John, "We have a current pressing need in our church", and I told him about the window repair. "I would like this gift to go to restoring that window", John replied, without hesitation. "I only have one condition – I would like the source of the gift to remain anonymous".

I kept John's wish until after his death, and then I asked his wife Janet for permission to tell this story at his service. Every time I look at that window I think about an extraordinary act of generosity; and when you see the window on Sunday mornings, I hope that you, too, will think about a gift given, not out of compulsion, but out of love.

May the Holy Spirit inspire us all to be people of faith, hope, and love, who can give with generous hearts.

An Update on the Christ Church Outreach Program

The second is this: 'Love your neighbor as yourself'. -Mark 12:31a

How to Prevent Hundreds of Thousands of People from Losing Their Jobs and Going Hungry - Ben Shuman

Bishop Mariann Budde recently spoke about the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program. Speaking to people brought here as children, "I want you to know that you belong here. We love you; we are so proud of you; and we need your gifts, talents, and hard work to help make this country live up to its greatest ideals." It is clear from her advocacy that she supports loving her neighbor. Her sentiment means a lot to me because it reflects my understanding of God's will for us. Loving our neighbors is what outreach is all about.

So, why care about the issue? The DACA program allowed dreamers, a term used for a person who was not authorized to be in the United States but had been brought here as a child, to work legally in the United States. The LA Times reports that most DACA recipients are employed and about half are in school. Without work, people and families face hunger and homelessness. They begin to fall through the safety nets and they suffer. Do we care? Many say that after all, the law is the law. However, in a democracy, citizens should participate in the governing of their society, including encouraging the development of just laws.

A few years ago I had the privilege of attending a quinceañera, a culturally significant event that celebrates the 15th birthday of a young woman. The young woman was a dreamer. Over dinner, I heard the conversation turn to whether she should register for the DACA program along with the risks and opportunities that may entail for her life. Many dreamers have registered for the program: according to the PEW Research Center nearly 790,000 have received work permits and deportation relief through the program.

As Christians we must consider God's word. Consider Leviticus 19:33, "When an alien resides with you in your land, do not mistreat him" or Deuteronomy 24:20-21, "When you beat your olive trees, do not go over the branches a second time. Leave what remains for the alien, the fatherless, and the widow" or Malachi 3:5, "So I will come near to you for judgment. I will be quick to testify against...those who deprive aliens of justice, but do not fear me."

Before you form a final opinion on the issue, also consider that the President appeared to call on Congress to legalize DACA within six months in a tweet on September 5th. Bishop Mariann has also emphasized the importance of forming laws to help dreamers. In fact, she said, "we will turn our attention to Congress." Let us all pray that dreamers will not go without food or shelter as the society they grew up calling home decides their fate.

Acts 23:6 When Paul noticed that some were Sadducees and others were Pharisees, he called out in the council, "Brothers, I am a Pharisee, a son of Pharisees. I am on trial concerning the hope of the resurrection of the dead."

Music at Christ Church

The Lutheran Connection

October 31st marks the 500th anniversary of the posting of Martin Luther's <u>Ninety-five Theses</u> on the chapel door at Wittenberg. At Christ Church, we have honored the "Lutheran Connection" in liturgical music for countless years. We regularly sing Luther's poetic paraphrase of Psalm 46 *A mighty fortress is our God* in the splendid English translation by Catherine Winkworth. We are lucky that the editors of The Hymnal 1982 chose to include not only the stately Bach harmonization of the tune (# 688), but also Luther's original jazzy rhythmic version of the chorale (# 687), which has become a treasured part of our congregational repertoire in recent years.

Other chorales from the time of Martin Luther may be found in our hymnal at # 421 All glory be to God on high – a poetic paraphrase of the Gloria – and at # 496 How bright appears the morning star. This Christmas, we will introduce # 80 From heaven on high I come to you, which Luther wrote for his family's devotions. Although Away in a manger is often said to be by Luther, neither the words nor music appeared in print until 1888 and only in America, making it unlikely to be from his pen.

Besides being a monk, a university professor, and reformer, Luther was also a skilled musician, both singer and composer. He published clear instructions in his <u>Deutsche Messe</u> of 1526 about preserving the polyphonic choir repertoire of the Roman Catholic Mass and enriching it with German hymns to be sung by all within the framework of the reformed liturgy.

During the month of October (and beyond), we will be recognizing and honoring Luther's 500th anniversary through music by singing English translations of his hymns, both in their lively original Renaissance rhythms, and also in the majestic settings of J. S. Bach:

Kyrie	God, Father in heaven above
Gloria	All glory be to God on high
Sanctus	Isaiah, mighty seer in days of old
Lord's Prayer	Our Father, thou in heaven above
Agnus Dei	O Lamb of God, pure, spotless

News About Our Korean Congregation

The Washington Korean Christ Episcopal Church, which has been holding Sunday worship services at 1:00 pm at our church since February 2012, is moving to Virginia, effective October 1. Earlier this year, Fr. Valentine Han, a Korean priest and vicar of the Holy Cross Korean Episcopal Church in Fairfax, retired from active ministry. Since Fr. Han's retirement, Fr. Athanasius Choi has been making weekly trips to Fairfax to celebrate and preach at the Sunday morning service at Holy Cross. He then travels back across the river to be at our Korean service at 1:00 pm.

The people of Holy Cross decided that they wanted Fr. Choi to be the permanent vicar of their church, and during the summer The Diocese of Virginia, with the blessing of the Diocese of Washington, communicated its hope that Fr. Choi would take this position, and merge the Rockville congregation with the Fairfax congregation. This is a very helpful development, as financial support of the Rockville congregation from the Diocese of Seoul ended in January 2017, and the Holy Cross congregation does have financial support as a mission of the Diocese of Virginia.

Fr. Choi plans to remain in residence at the Hillstrom House, next door to our church building, until the summer of 2018. There are plans to continue a small weekly prayer group here at our church until Fr. Choi moves to Virginia.

I'm very pleased that our leadership welcomed Fr. Choi at the end of 2011, and that we provided a nesting place for this small, but vibrant and energetic congregation to begin its life in worship and in ministry. God's continued blessings be upon Fr. Choi, his wife Margaret, and the good people of their church, who will always be our special friends.
