From the Rector

All Saints is that day we celebrate in honor of the Olympic athletes of spirituality. And maybe not even just the athletes, but the gold medal winners, and maybe a few silvers. Bronze winners are beatified...but, not canonized.

And All Souls, on the other hand, not so much. All Souls is for the rest of us...those of us who aren't maybe such strong swimmers, runners, or gymnasts as the saints whom we celebrate today. It is for those of us who give it a good try, but maybe aren't so very successful.

The celebration of All Souls makes me think of my favorite invitation to the Eucharist:

“This is the table, not of the Church, but of the Lord.

It is to be made ready for those who love God and those who want to love God more.

So, come you who have much faith and you who have little, you who have been here often and you who have not been for long, you who have tried to follow and you who have failed.

Come, not because it is I who invite you: it is our Lord.

It is God's will that those who want God should meet God here.”

Do you find yourselves in these words? Are you in different words at different times?

I find myself as one who is struggling, at times, with my faith. Not so much with my faith in God, but in myself. Am I capable of living a faithful, and faith-filled life?

Some of you may have heard me say before that I love the Nicene Creed that says “We believe”...I so prefer that to the “I believe...” because it gives me a chance to lean on those around me. I know that at least one person in this space believes in something when my faithfulness may be flagging. We rely on each other to keep moving forward. Yet, we all are just ordinary people.

We have a special day to celebrate our ordinary nature by celebrating those who have gone before us in death. Those who are just as ordinary as we are, yet still special in God's eyes.

And, if we are faithfully commemorating them, they must be special to us as well. And maybe we even think of some of them as the saints or angels whom we have encountered.

If they are our saints and angels, why is that? What was it about them, and their ordinary lives that so deeply affected us? Did they embody the presence of God in our lives? Is there a page in their book of life from which we can borrow, and offer the same to someone else?

Maybe that is the challenge for the so called “rest of us.”

The rest of us. What does that mean? Just because we aren't the Olympic athletes of spirituality doesn't mean that we are out of the game.

What if we were to commemorate those people once a year, but every day carry on their work in the lives of those in our own orbit, especially those whom we find challenging?

I am that person whom I invite to the table with my favorite invitation. I will not win any awards, but I certainly can do my best to emulate those ordinary people who have so deeply affected me, and made a difference, in my life. Let's do more than commemorate them when they are gone, let's embody Christ in the ways that have meant so much to us.

Let's live extraordinary lives, even if we will never receive a medal for it – at least a medal we can see. We are all the cloud of witnesses, saints, and souls.

Rise Against Hunger

When it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a deserted place, and the hour is now late; send the crowds away so that they may go into the villages and buy food for themselves." Jesus said to them, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." Matthew 14:15-16

After Jesus directed his disciples to feed the multitude in that remote place, they collected what little bread and fish they had, leading to one of the few miracles documented in all four Gospels: the feeding of the 5,000.

Please mark your calendars for Saturday, November 23rd, 2019, at 10:00 a.m., when the Outreach Committee invites you to "give them something to eat" as we gather for our annual **Rise Against Hunger** packing event.

Christ Church, in partnership with Rise Against Hunger, has prepared meal packets for over 200,000 children worldwide living in remote locations with few resources. Rise Against Hunger is a U.S.-based nonprofit hunger relief organization that supports both crisis response (disaster, famine relief, etc.) and transformational development programs (vocational training, early childhood development, etc.). The meals provided are easily stored and transported, shelf-stable, and nutritious. In a few hours, Christ Church volunteers assemble thousands of meal packets that are delivered to places of need worldwide such as Africa, Cambodia, Haiti, Nicaragua, and North Korea. Christ Church has been a leader among Maryland churches in support of this effort, with participants of all ages and generations making the event a highlight of our Outreach Ministry.

A key to the success of Rise Against Hunger Saturday is that it is organized as an efficient and family-friendly enterprise, with roles for every age and ability. Children and teens work alongside their parents, grandparents, and peers in a cooperative and raucous setting, where the work of our hands connects us all with our sisters and brothers all over our planet. It's also great fun!

Please look for further details and registration forms that will follow in the weekly bulletin as the event draws closer. The Outreach Committee will accept any donation but suggests \$25/adult. All children and youth are welcome to attend free! (Anyone under 16 must attend with an adult.) If you have questions or would like to sign up early, please e-mail David Craig at david@spacesaverVA.com.

CEC Becomes Designated Animal Friendly Congregation



St. Francis Flock is pleased to announce that Christ Episcopal Church (CEC) has been designated an "Animal Friendly Congregation". This designation is defined by the Episcopal Network for Animal Welfare (ENAW). ENAW provided the framework from which St. Francis Flock modeled itself to form its ministry.

Lori Nicely, Chair and Founding Member, explained, "In order to apply for status as an 'Animal Friendly Congregation' and be listed in the ENAW directory, we needed approval of the vestry, which we received in August". She added, "Our presentation was fairly simple and straightforward: we asked for a commitment from the church to please continue existing practices so that the church could be recognized and receive the designation".

The 5 criteria set forth by ENAW which the church had already met, and made a commitment to continue to meet, are as follows:

1. Support and uphold members engaged in animal welfare ministries.
This was already being done by CEC in its support of St. Francis Flock as an animal welfare ministry. The group formed in 2013 as an "informal ministry" and received vestry approval in 2015 as a formal ministry of the church.
2. Hold an "Animal Blessing" service annually.
The Blessing of the Animals is already a long-standing practice of CEC and pre-dates St. Francis Flock.
3. Provide pastoral care and prayer for members grieving the loss or illness of a pet
This was already being done by St. Francis Flock through its Bereavement Counseling services (initially provided by licensed counselor Eva Lin who later moved to Seattle, and now provided by Dr. Carolyn Cole, licensed psychologist), prayer lists, and Pet Memorial Services.
4. Not hold fundraisers that center upon the killing of animals (e.g., pig roasts, sport hunting, lobster broils, etc.).
This was already being done as CEC does not engage in such fundraisers.
5. Serve vegetarian fare during Lent and provide vegetarian options at community meals.
This was already being done, as St. Francis Flock and the CEC Fellowship Committee were already providing vegetarian options at church-sponsored events. There are no church-wide sponsored meals during Lent other than the Lenten Film Series which St. Francis Flock provides a light vegetarian/vegan dinner.

"This designation has been a goal of ours since our group's inception", said Lori. "It makes our church more inclusive and will attract new like-minded members, but will not detract from or deter anyone else from joining the church". Lori noted that several members who have joined St. Francis Flock came from other churches.

This is a beautiful collection of carols for baritone solo and chorus featuring soaring melodic lines and descants in the English tradition. Further British highlights include several selections originally performed by the King’s Singers such as the rhythmic Renaissance pieces Gaudete and the Spanish song Riu, Riu, Chiu, as well as popular holiday favorites including “Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas.”

Famous annual elements of the National Philharmonic Singers programs, such as The Twelve Days of Christmas, will return, but this year the audience will participate in an entirely new manner – *seated* throughout! Special guest organist/pianist Julie Vidrik Evans will be featured in the virtuosic “Bring a Torch Jeannette Isabella” on the large pipe organ as well play the organ for beautiful standards such as “There Shall a Star from Jacob Come Forth” by Mendelssohn and the tuneful “Magnificat in Bb Major” by Charles Villiers Stanford. The magic of Christmas is enhanced by Carols for All to Sing as well as a candlelight processional and the ever-favorite, “Recessional on Silent Night”. Please come and join us!

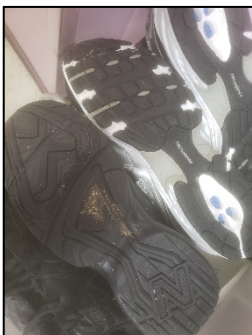
YARD SALE DIGNITY OR DO YOU ACCEPT ___?

Bargain Box volunteers are often asked whether we accept certain items or not. We do accept most new and gently used clothing and household items. There is a list on our website, www.bargain-box.org.

My personal sound bite response is that the Bargain Box is like a yard sale in a store. That's a way to explain why we don't have a fitting room, we can't hold items until tomorrow afternoon, all items are sold as is, there are no returns, refunds or exchanges, and all sales are final. The yard sale analogy can be taken one step further. Consider that the Bargain Box is Christ Church's year-round yard sale. Think about the items you are donating and now imagine you are putting them for sale in front of your own house. Would you? Would you buy them from a neighbor's yard sale? Would you buy them from a classy upscale boutique thrift store such as the Bargain Box? Or would they be better off in your recycling or trash bin?

The list on our website offers the basic guidelines of new or gently used. Let's define new—New with tags on! But tags from Woodies or Hecht's, out of business in 1995 and 2006, respectively, may be vintage and collectible, retro and chic, or just plain old and outdated. No one wants waist bands that crunch or shoulder pads and dry cleaner "foam" hangers that crumble. Yellow is a very good color, but not for the inside of lamp shades, the pages of a book or the plastic packaging on a tool or toy. M&M's are a great snack, but Mold & Mildew can change the aroma of the entire store.

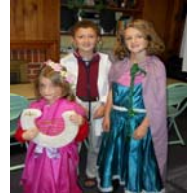

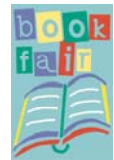

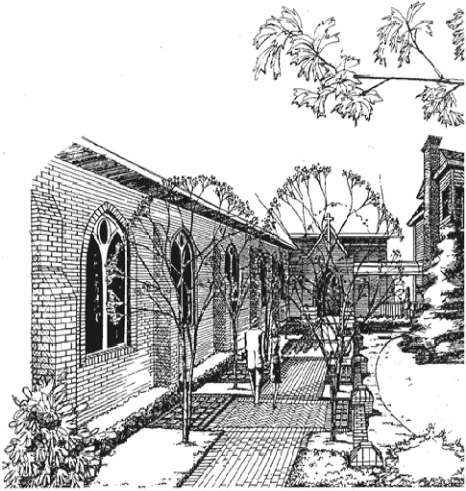
