

From the Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

December will once again be a time filled with activity at Christ Church, and in this issue of the <u>Angelus</u> you will find announcements of various opportunities for us to gather as a community and observe the spirit of Advent and Christmas. I thought I would mention a few moments in this month that will be special for me:

- The National Philharmonic singers visit Christ Church with their annual December concert, "Carols Around the World", on Saturday, December 2nd, at 8:00 p.m. in the church. Admission is free, but donations will be gratefully received to benefit our friends at Community Ministries of Rockville.
- 2.) Come to a very special **Jazz Vespers, Sunday, December 3rd, at 5:00 p.m.** Our regular Jazz Vespers Quartet will be joined by guest vocalist Juanita Williams. Ms. Williams sang for many years with the celebrated Airmen of Note US. Air Force jazz band, and she performed at our May Jazz Vespers to the great delight of all who attended. We will be featuring favorite classic Christmas songs, accompanying the liturgy of evening prayer. Donations received will benefit Interfaith Works, one of the great Montgomery County social ministries organizations.
- 3.) Be at our Welcoming Committee's semi-annual reception to welcome newcomer individuals and families at Christ Church on Sunday, December 3rd, during the 10:00 a.m. hour in the Murdock Room.
- 4.) The annual Adult Christmas Dinner is on Saturday, December 9th, from 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. in the Murdock Room. Information on making reservations, cost, and availability of childcare is found elsewhere in this issue. I'm aware that Episcopal priests have traditionally been grumpy about celebrating Christmas during Advent (I've already challenged that tradition with this December's Jazz Vespers!), but one of the great themes of Advent is hospitality, which is gloriously fulfilled each year in this dinner sponsored by our Fellowship Committee. It's a great time to greet old friends and meet new ones.
- 5.) Christmas Eve: Always a special day in the life of Christ Church. This year it is on Sunday, so that morning we will only have one worship service, at 10:00 a.m. but it is a special one as we traditionally observe the dressing of the Christmas crèche with the help of our Sunday School children. Later, our regular schedule of Christmas eve services takes place, with services at 4:00 p.m. (featuring our Nativity Pageant); 8:00 p.m., preceded by anthems and carols at 7:30 p.m.; and 11:00 p.m., preceded by anthems and carols at 10:30 p.m.

As I journey through my final two months of ministry at Christ Church, I think that many of you may enjoy the Adult Forum I'm presenting on Sunday, December 10th, during the 10:00 a.m. hour. It's called "Reflections on 19+ Years of Ministry", and I will celebrate the good things that have happened at Christ Church during my time with you.

In closing this letter, I want to say "thank you" to quite a few folks who have sent me emails or notes since my retirement announcement, or who have stopped to say "You have been an important part of my life, and faith journey." All I can acknowledge is that the feeling is mutual – what a privilege I've had in serving in this place! And – since I've told you all before that every December, I worry about church finances – the greatest gift for my peace of mind is knowing that <u>everyone</u> has made a pledge of financial support to Christ Church for 2018, before the end of December. With strong leadership, and your faithful caring and support, this church has a wonderful future ahead.

Environmental Stewardship Did you Know?



Plastic bags are **not** recyclable and should always be disposed of inthe **trash**. Plastic bags damage the machines that shred recyclables. This can happen when we either toss plastic bags in the recycling bin or put our recyclable plastics, paper and cardboard in plastic bags and toss the whole thing in the recyclable bins. This practice also increases the fees and fines for recycling.

Clear and/or white bags (the only exception) may be recycled at all major grocery stores in their bins marked for such.

Plastic Pollution: Let's Pick It Up

Look closely as you walk or bike or drive down the street. From cities to suburbs, small towns to seashores, plastic bottles, bags and packaging litter our landscape, flowing into storm drains and watersheds. Ultimately, an estimated 8.8 million tons of plastic trash enters the ocean every year – but that number is reportedly on course to double by 2025.

Why Is It a Problem?

You probably don't grind pieces of plastic into your morning coffee. You probably don't add plastic bits to your dog food or cat food. And you probably don't let your pet parakeet nibble on plastic straws. Why? Because consuming plastics can be fatal, both to humans and other creatures. Most plastics were not made to be ingested and generally cannot be digested. They're made from chemicals that you would never deliberately eat or drink, much less feed to other animals.

We All Make Choices

So, why do you and I force fish and other marine life to dine on plastic trash? Well, probably because we don't really mean to do it. We get careless. We walk away and forget that bottle of water we put next to our foot at the bus bench. We don't cover our recycling bin on a windy day. Sometimes, we just don't think.

Here's the Good News

Cutting the flow of plastic trash doesn't take an international treaty, or billions of dollars in R&D spending, or even an inconvenient Al Gore documentary (although all of that might indeed help).

- You and I simply need to pick up our plastic.
- Better still, you and I can take a few moments each day or each week to pick up plastic trash that others have left behind and drop it in a recycling container.

Wait, It's Really that Simple?

Yes – and no. The bigger problem won't be solved so easily. All the plastic trash that's entered the world's oceans will remain a harmful pollutant for a long, long time. A lot of smart people

around the globe are studying the problem and working on ways to address the enormous volume of plastic trash in the sea.

Then...What?

You and I can directly and personally slow the flow of trash into watersheds and other ecosystems. Start at your feet, then expand to your street. This simple action will make a big difference. Plastic isn't fish food. So, let's pick it up!

In 2017, the Flock hosted its first ever "Celebrate Animals" Fair. We extend special thanks and prayers to our non-profit participants who continue to do God's work in care of His creatures:

- Your Dog's Friend: Specializes in force-free positive dog training and provides free workshops.
- <u>Star Gazing Farm</u>: Provides safe haven to abused, stray, and neglected farm animals.
- <u>Metropolitan Guinea Pig Rescue:</u> Educates on proper feeding and care of Guinea pigs.
- <u>Mid Atlantic Dogs Search and Rescue:</u> Provides professional search and rescue dog teams to official agencies at no-charge.
- <u>Fish Feel</u>: Educates the community about fish being sentient beings deserving of humane treatment and protection. Fish Feel is a one-of-a-kind organization based in Silver Spring.
- <u>Dogs on Deployment (DoD)</u>: Helps military service members locate volunteers to board their pets while away on military duty.
- <u>Animal Welfare League of Montgomery County:</u> Provides no-kill shelter, Chompers Pet Food Bank, and programs directed at education, adoption, animal shelter, and low-cost spay/neuter services. The League is no stranger to our parish, as we support Chompers via our pet food donations, which helps keep pets with their guardians and out of the shelters.
- <u>House with a Heart:</u> Senior cat/dog sanctuary that provides forever homes for seniors if not adopted.
- <u>Senior Dog Sanctuary of Maryland</u>: This sanctuary provides a permanent safe haven for senior dogs who are unable to be cared for by their owners, have been abandoned or abused, or face euthanasia.
- <u>The Humane Society of the United States:</u> A partner and ally of St. Francis Flock through its Faith Outreach program, HSUS works to address animal abuse that occurs through factory farming, dogfighting, and animal testing in cosmetics.
- <u>Montgomery County Humane Society</u>: Helps to alleviate overcrowding in public shelters which saves lives. MCHS takes cats and dogs out of overcrowded shelters and gives them the care, socialization, enrichment, and new homes they need and deserve.
- <u>Pet Connect Rescue:</u> Founded in the wake of Hurricane Katrina, Pet Connect saves the lives of abandoned dogs and cats and places them in loving and permanent homes.
- <u>Phoenix Landing</u>: Facilitates adoption for parrots, from parakeets to macaws, because most birds need a succession of good homes.
- <u>Days End Farm Horse Rescue</u>: Ensures quality care and treatment of horses through intervention, education, and outreach.

Upcoming and Ongoing Activities

- <u>Pet food drive to help keep pets with their families.</u> Please provide unopened donations in the shopping cart in the main dining area of the basement (same cart as Manna donations) and the Flock will deliver to the Animal Welfare League of Montgomery County's **Chompers Pet Food Bank**. Pet food donations benefit local families struggling to provide for their pets. In many cases, providing pet food to families makes the difference between being able to keep their pet or having to surrender them due to a lack of food. With our donations, Christ Church is making a difference!
- <u>Pet grievance ministry.</u> St. Francis Flock provides ministry to those grieving the loss or illness of a beloved pet. Please contact Carolyn Cole at <u>stfrancisflock@cecrockville.org</u> for more information.

Music at Christ Church

Christ the King & Advent Preparations

As the Last Sunday after Pentecost (aka The Sunday after Thanksgiving) approaches, we prepare to celebrate with biblical readings, hymns, and anthems which proclaim Christ the King. "Crown Him with Many Crowns", "Rejoice the Lord is King", and "Jesus shall reign". In some years, the Choir has sung the famous "Hallelujah" from Handel's <u>Messiah</u> with its repeating line "King of Kings, and Lord of Lords". This year, both Choristers and Choir sing an anthem composed especially for them two seasons ago and dedicated to Michele Craig and Craig Peters. The anthem "Rejoice in Christ the King" contains the words "Let heaven's arches ring with praises" and uses bells playing the familiar Westminster Chimes in a composer's playful text-painting.

As we move into the new church year of Advent, a number of changes in our service mark the four weeks in which we look forward to the coming of Christ at Christmas. At the 9:00 a.m. service, we sing the "Kyrie", "Holy, holy, holy", and "Lamb of God" based on the medieval Advent hymn "Creator of the stars of night" (Creator alme siderum) and composed for us by our Music Director. At the 11:00 a.m. service, the Choir help the congregation to offer the florid melodies of the medieval "Missa Marialis" (aka Missa Cum Jubilo) found in the service music section of the Hymnal 1982.

On Advent I, December 3rd, we hear the evocative motet of the late Paul Manz "E'en so, Lord Jesus, quickly come" and the haunting spiritual "Keep your lamps trimmed and burning". Then on Advent II, December 10th, we have the opportunity to hear "Comfort ye, my people" from Handels's Messiah. Advent III brings us Bach's "Prepare thyself, Zion" offered by the Choristers, and the famous Tudor anthem "Rejoice in the Lord alway". Advent IV is also Christmas Eve this year, with one morning service at 10:00 a.m. including the Dressing of the Creche. There will certainly be an abundance of Advent hymns and Christmas carols throughout December.

Renaissance Germany Comes to Rockville on December 3rd

We are blessed in being able to offer choral Mass settings as part of the monthly musical cycle at Christ Church. Not only that, but our choir for these occasions is an inter-generational one including the boys and girls of our Choristers, teen Choral Scholars, and adults of several generations in the Christ Church Choir. On Sunday, December 3rd at the 11:00 a.m. Eucharist, we celebrate with the music of German composer and organist Hans Leo Hassler, born 450 years ago in Nuremberg. By the age of twenty, he had moved to Venice, where he became friends with Giovanni Gabrieli and studied organ and composition with Giovanni's uncle Andrea Gabrieli at St. Mark's basilica. The following year, Hassler moved to Augsburg, where he served the Catholic nobleman and banker Octavian Fugger. As a Lutheran, Hassler was highly productive in composing liturgical for both Protestant and Catholic usage.

Hassler's <u>Missa super Dixit Maria</u> is known as a "parody Mass" because it recycles melodies and, indeed, entire sections from his motet <u>Dixit Maria</u> (Mary's response to the Ave Maria of the Angel Gabriel), by substituting the Greek and Latin words from the Mass: Kyrie, Gloria, Sanctus, and Agnus Dei. In this concise form, the composer made further use of his own musical material, and linked this particular setting to the themes of Advent. Our choirs take special delight in offering both Hassler's Motet and Mass during the month of December.

National Philharmonic Singers in Concert

Please join the National Philharmonic Singers for a festive holiday concert here at Christ Church on Saturday, December 2nd, 2017 at 8:00 p.m.

Carols from Around the World highlight this annual event, a benefit performance for the Community Ministries of Rockville, raising monies for this worthy cause at one of their most crucial times of the year.

Beginning with a processional to *Gitanjali* chant, the Singers will present *Gaudete*, a Swedish collection of holiday arrangements of favorites of *In Dulci Jubilo; Lo, How a Rose;* and *Psallite*.

To balance this traditional music, the Philharmonic Singers will present new Christmas arrangements of *The Wexford Carol; Sleep Little Baby, Sleep;* and the beautiful, tender *O Magnum Mysterium* by Nicholas White.

The lighter side of Christmas music is explored with *Jingle Bells; Carols for All to Sing;* and the audience-favorite of *Twelve Days of Christmas* before closing with a moving candlelight rendition of *Silent Night*.

The National Philharmonic Singers is a chamber choir and one of several performing ensembles of the National Philharmonic, which is in residence at the Music Center at Strathmore. As such, it promotes works suited for smaller ensembles, whether with accompaniment or *a cappella*. Its repertoire includes pieces from the 16th to the 21st centuries, and it often premieres new compositions by local composers. This is the 12th year of performance at Christ Church.

There is no admission charge. *Free-will donations will benefit the Community Ministries* of Rockville.

Anna Mighell is a retired volunteer. She recently wrote her memories of working at the Bargain Box for 20 years. "I started


working at the Bargain Box about 20 years ago. My dear friend, Irene Orris, was invited to work there by Doris Richetts, her friend and neighbor. Doris and her husband, Ted, were members of Christ Episcopal Church. Irene asked me if I would like to work with here, which I did. We had many good years there. We worked at the Bargain Box when it was located in back of the old Magruders. We were to work one Friday a month but Cai Conway told us if we liked it they needed someone every Friday morning. We decided to work every Friday morning since we were both retired. Cai was an angel. She was always finding clothes for someone who was looking for a job. Soon after Irene and I started working there we knocked over some glassware and broke it. Cai would not let us pay for it. She said the store could cover it. Nellie Lou Quay was the store manager then. She was a dynamic lady in her eighties. She liked to call you an angel when you volunteered to help out. One day not long after we started working there we had our first experience with shop lifting (At that time the cost of a piece of clothing was only stapled on). One lady brought to the cash register a lovely evening gown. It had a \$2 price tag attached to it. Irene and I were very surprised it cost so little, but we sold it to her. Later that day someone found a ticket on the floor for \$18. We were sorry

to learn that even at a store run by the Church some would steal. Jane Berg worked for many years doing consignments. She did such a good job. Dar Carroll enlisted some of her golfing friends to become volunteers at the Bargain Box. Virginia Grier was in charge of Wednesdays when I worked there. She was such a lady and inspiration to all who knew her. I started working also on the 3rd Wednesday of the month. When the shopping center was torn down to make room for the Town Center, we had to move to our present location on Hungerford Drive near the Fire Station. Gina McAndrew was very helpful in the transition period when Nellie Lou Quay could no longer be the manager. Donna Wolohojian started working at the Bargain Box and became the full-time manager which she still is. She does a wonderful job, spends many hours, and is totally devoted to the Bargain Box. I missed the opening blessing of the new Bargain Box location but was told Holy Water was sprinkled in the store. Maybe that's another reason it's such a special place. I was very lucky to have worked with Frank Braisted. Frank was a very loving man - the customers loved him- he was especially fond of birds. At one time he had 26 birds but had to give up all but one because of health issues. There was a homeless man named Joseph who used to come in for free clothing. Fortunately, we had a good supply of new underwear which Joseph appreciated. Frank always called him "Saint Joseph." Frank also said his vet reminded him of Saint Francis. There were so many dedicated and interesting volunteers at the Bargain Box. I wish I could mention them all but their names will be listed in God's book. Iness Davis was a former Bargain Box customer who became a volunteer when her husband passed away. She was about 90 at the time. She was so much fun. One day she

was modeling the hats and had us all laughing. She was very good at folding clothes for the customers. She knew how to turn a suit jacket inside out to protect it. She also knew how to remove stains and spots from clothing and would give helpful tips to customers. I always thought she should write a manual about how to remove stains. An embarrassing moment for me was when I sold Ted Conway's bicycle helmet to a customer for one dollar. Ted used to volunteer with consignments. He would ride his bicycle to the store. He took his helmet off and put it on a shelf - I guess. Later a customer brought up a bicycle helmet with no price on it. I said it was a dollar. Later I found out that it was Ted Conway's new bicycle helmet and he paid forty-four dollars for it. I offered to pay the \$44, but Ted wouldn't let me. He said the family got a good laugh out of it. One inspiration experience for me was when a young Spanish woman wanted to buy two religious paintings. The reminded her of the pictures of saints in her country. She had no way to get them home. I told her I could bring them to her. That same day there was a small sculpture of the Pieta by Michelangelo. She bought that also. I brought the pictures to her apartment and she told me her son's name was Michelangelo. There was a dear lady named Cliffodine. She loved to buy jewelry at the Bargain Box. She always bought a lot of things. One day she was going to a party and found the perfect hat at the Bargain Box. She had breast cancer and passed away. Her son would come in to say hello and shop at the Bargain Box. So many customers would tell us about their lives. I think they felt free to talk because the Bargain Box is run by a church. Truly it is a wonderful witness for the Church as well as providing low cost items

and money for many worthwhile charities."

THE BARGAIN BOX GETS AROUND
